

# RESTRICTIONS ON WEATHER REPORT PARTLY RELAXED

Now it can be told. Weather restrictions issued by the U. S. weather bureau in Washington, D. C., in cooperation with national defense officials on the Pacific coast have been partially relaxed according to the local weather bureau this morning. Weather forecasts for a 26-hour period based on observations from 4:30 a. m. until 6:30 a. m. the following day may now be issued, as may temperatures and precipitation for the preceding day.

With word of this comes announcement that total rainfall for December to date is 7.02 inches and is the best monthly rainfall of any on record. Prior to this the best monthly rainfall was in November 1928 when precipitation for the total month equalled 6.66 inches. Dec. 2 precipitation totaled 2.89 for a 24-hour period and Dec. 16 was the second heaviest rainfall recorded during the month for a 24-hour period when 2.17 inches fell.
