

East-West Stars Battle to 6-6 Tie in Mud Before Slim Crowd

EAST LINE POWER OFFSETS WESTERN PASSING ATTACK

Oklahoma Star's Heaves Bring Tie And Near Victory; Westfall Best Gainer

New Orleans, Jan. 3. — (AP) — The Eastern Stars and their powerful line exactly balanced the West's jinx and passing attack today as the all-star teams battled to a thrilling 6-6 tie in slick mud before a disappointing and shivering crowd of 35,000.

The game, transferred here from San Francisco because of the war was a ding-dong battle all the way and far more spectacular than the score would indicate.

Bill Dudley of Virginia, the nation's highest scorer last season, proved himself a great score-preventer. He intercepted four passes, two deep in the East team's territory.

The smashing play of the Eastern line dominated the scene for three quarters. But in the final period Indian Jack Jacobs of Oklahoma began passing and running to gain a tie and come close to victory in the final minutes.

The East has won five, the West 10. This game was the second tie.

The Easterners took the second half kickoff and drove 67 yards to their touchdown in nine plays. The line opened up huge holes as Bill Geyer of Colgate and Bob Westfall of Michigan rammed to the West's 23-yard line. Then, after two plays gained only a yard Dudley faded back and tossed a screen pass to Geyer.

Geyer took the ball on the 25 near the West side line, following line blocking for half the distance and stiff-armed two tacklers to score standing up. Dudley missed a place kick for the extra point.

The West capitalized on a fumble by Bob Glass of Tulane which Center Brad Sheafe of St. Mary's recovered on the East 21. Jacobs completed a pass to Vike Francis of Nebraska on the ten and then tossed to Bob Robertson of Southern California on the goal line. Ralph Fife of Pittsburgh blocked an attempted place kick by Frankie Albert of Stanford.

A few minutes later Jacobs' running carried the ball to the Eastern 26 but a fumble ended the thrust.

A passing attack by Bill Smaltz of Penn State carried the ball to the West's nine-yard line in the second period but Esu Naranche of Montana intercepted a pass.

In the third period a Western drive sparked by passing of Washington State's Bill Sewell carried to the East nine, but the thrust was hurled back by Alf Bauman of Northwestern, John Rokisky of Duquesne and the other Eastern linemen.

The East gained 151 yards rushing to the West's 75, and the Westerners led in passing, 118 to 49, the West led 11 to 10 in first downs. Westfall was the day's leading ground gainer with 94 yards in 20 tries.

MINNESOTA COACH GOES TO MARINES

Minneapolis, Jan. 3. — (AP) — News that Coach Bernie Bierman of the University of Minnesota had been ordered to report to the United States marine headquarters at Quantico, Va., by January 15 exploded like a bombshell at the university today, but officials withheld a formal statement.

President Walter C. Coffey declared he would have to withhold official opinion until confirmation of Bierman's status had been received from Frank McCormick, athletic director and Bierman's direct superior. McCormick is in Chicago, expected to return here Sunday.

General university sources meanwhile were debating the effect of Bierman's recall on the Gopher coaching situation. If Bierman goes on active duty, the general opinion was that the rule of succession would find Dr. George Hauser, next in football command and head line coach, carrying on until Bierman's return.

PRO GRID STARS AID NAVY RELIEF

New York, Jan. 3. — (AP) — Chicago's professional football Bears, who got in the first lick of the 1941 campaign against the College All-Stars, will apply the finishing touches to the national gridiron picture tomorrow against a picked squad from their own play-for-pay league.

The Pacific northwest's two touring basketball teams showed the midwest how to win close ones Friday night—even though one game involved a fist fight before the final gun sounded.

The University of Washington, unbeaten in seven straight games, added another victory to its string, downing Michigan State, 45 to 42, at East Lansing. The game was marred by a fist fight between Chet Aubuchon of Michigan state and Guard Bill Morris of Washington in the closing minutes, when Washington wiped out a five-point deficit with a finish-drive by Harry Nelson and Bill Gissberg. Guard Bob Lindh led the Husky scoring with 14 points.

Oregon State, playing at Springfield, Illinois, met Texas A. & M., and finished strong to win, 36-30. The Texans were behind throughout the first half but made a game of it in the second period, going ahead once and tying the score twice. John Mandic paced the OSC victory with 14 points.

Washington State remained at home, but did just as well, swamping Eastern Washington College under a 56-38 score at Pullman.

CARDS AND YANKS CHOICE OF DOYLE

Miami Beach, Fla., Jan. 3. — (AP) — Baseball's too uncertain this year for Jack Doyle to be quoting odds yet, but the St. Louis Cardinals and the New York Yankees look like pennant winners to the Broadway betting commissioner.

"The game is more unpredictable now than it ever has been before," he explained today. "The important factor is the effect of the war. Uncle Sam will be the big player next season."

Usually ready by this time to list his early prices—considered the last word by those who follow the big league races—Doyle is holding off now until he can learn which players will be called into the army.

BUDDY BAER SURE HE'LL DUMP LOUIS; CHAMP ALSO GOOD

New York, Jan. 3. — (AP) — Buddy Baer, dripping confidence and sweat from every pore, argued today that his chances of whipping Joe Louis in Madison Square Garden next Friday night are better on three counts than they were last May when he dumped his foe on a championship ear before being stopped by the heavyweight king.

"I'll have two good hands, my weight will be better and I'll have a sharper left," predicted bulging Bud as he grimaced at the scales which showed his poundage was down to a mere 245.

Virtually all the receipts from this fight will go to the naval relief society. Louis has donated his 40 per cent cut and Promoter Mike Jacobs is working without profit. Baer is giving 2½ per cent from his challenging fee to the sailor organization.

Veteran fight observers at Buddy's Lakewood, N. J., camp were willing to string along with him on his theories about the value of two good hands being better than one and also that at his present weight he probably was stronger than he was last spring but they could see little improvement in the Baer left.

Greenwood Lake, N. Y., Jan. 3. — (AP) — Joe Louis convinced four sparmates and a crowd of visitors today that he will be in shape to defend his heavyweight boxing crown against Buddy Baer in New York's Madison Square Garden, Jan. 9.

The champion turned on his punching power for better than four rounds in a brisk workout, knocking out two of the four sparring partners he faced. Then he pounded the light and heavy bags, skipped rope and tossed the medicine ball before Trainer Jack Blackburn led him to the showers.

BABE RUTH HURT IN AUTO MISHAP

New York, Jan. 3. — (AP) — The condition of Babe Ruth, taken to a hospital last night, is not serious, his daughter, Dorothy, said today.

She refused to give any details as to the nature of his ailment or to what hospital he had been taken.

One report was that Ruth was in a nervous condition as a result of an automobile accident.

A friend of the family who declined use of his name said Ruth was ordered to the hospital by his physician for a complete rest. The friend said that several days ago while the 46-year-old former home-run king was driving his new car near Tuxedo Park, N. Y., he was forced off the road to avoid hitting another machine. Ruth suffered from shock and a highly nervous condition, the friend added.

SNOWBANK SAVES GIRL FROM FIRE

ROSE BOWL GAME REFUNDS JAN. 10

Corvallis, Jan. 3. — (AP) — Football fans who bought tickets to the Rose bowl game at Pasadena will get their refunds in a short time, Percy Loecey, Oregon State college athletic director, said today.

In a telegram from New Orleans, Loecey said he would start at Pasadena to confer with Tournament of Roses officials and would arrive here January 9. Issuance of refunds will start the next day, he said.

Loecey indicated that he had been besieged by requests for refund information since the game was transferred to Durham, N. C.

DUTCH AWAKE TO TOKYO TREACHERY

Batavia, N. E. I., Jan. 5. — (AP) — Dutch naval vessels were ordered to sea Nov. 30 while United States and Japan were still negotiating because the Dutch "did not trust the game the Japanese were playing," it was disclosed tonight by Aneta, official N. E. I. news agency.

The disclosure came with publication of the story of the only surviving crew member of a Dutch submarine which torpedoed and sank four heavily laden Japanese transports off the Malayan coast the day after the N. E. I. and Japan went to war.

The submarine later was lost after hitting a mine in the South China sea, on Dec. 25.

KNIFER INDICTED

Portland, Ore., Jan. 3. — (AP) — Ivan David Ryan, 20, Tacoma, accused of the fatal stabbing of Herbert M. Smith, 19, in a fight Nov. 1, was indicted on a second-degree murder charge by the Multnomah county grand jury yesterday.

OREGON TO PLAY COUGARS FRIDAY IN OPENING TILT

The northern division, Pacific Coast conference basketball campaign of 1942 will get under way next Friday when the Washington Huskies and Idaho Vandals open a two-game series in Seattle and the Washington State Cougars meet the Oregon Webfoots in the first of two games in Eugene. The Cougars are the defending champions.

The Huskies, division favorites because of their surprise showing on an eastern road trip, are expected to start their drive with a series victory. The Vandals are bringing to Seattle a new coach, Guy Wicks, who succeeded Forrest Twogood at the end of last season, and their power is an unknown quantity.

The Washington squad includes eight lettermen and an exceptional crop of youngsters from last year's frosh team. One sophomore, Doug Fori, has crowded his way into the starting lineup at a forward position. The other starters are Chuck Gilmer, center; Bobby Lindh, forward; Bill Morris and Norm Dalthorp, guards.

Wicks is starting his season at Moscow with but four lettermen.

Washington State, which was hard hit by graduation, is still tabbed as the team to beat for the division crown.

CANADIAN HOCKEY TEAMS TRIUMPH

Montreal, Jan. 3. — (AP) — Montreal extended its winning streak to two games tonight by scoring three times in the third period and defeating Detroit, 4 to 1, before a crowd of 8,000. The win lifted the Canadiens into a sixth place tie in the National Hockey league standings with Brooklyn.

The Canadiens surged from behind a 1-0 deficit in the first period to go on to victory against a Detroit team that was widely outplayed.

The veteran Joe Blake came through with the tying goal late in the second period while defenseman Jimmy Orlando was serving his third penalty of the period.

Toronto, Ont., Jan. 3. — (AP) — Toronto went into a temporary tie with Boston for the National Hockey leadership tonight, beating the Brooklyn Americans, 4-2, in a ragged contest. The Bruins can break the tie by either beating or tying the Americans in New York Sunday night.
