NATUROPATHY
Naturopathy is one of the older sciences. Its principles have stood the test of time. Some writers on the history of medicine have stated that the first medical school was naturopathic. As the knowledge of man has increased, the principles of naturopathy have revealed its newer ramifications in the field of therapy and its broader application in the maintenance and restoration of the physical organism to its rightful and healthful state.

Naturopathy is the greatest health system as it is a culmination of that in all sciences, which deals with the restoring it to a state of normal mal manner.

Naturopathy is defined in the Oregon law as "A system of treating the human body by use of drugless methods, which has for its object the maintaining of the body in, or of restoring it to, a state of normal health."

The Oregon law provides that to practice naturopathy the physician must be a high school graduate as well as a graduate of a college of naturopathy maintaining a four year course of not less than four thousand hours, and must have obtained by examinations a certificate from the Basic Science Board and a license from the State Naturopathic Board of Examiners.
