

MEN ON ISLANDS MAY BE FREED BY U. S. NEGOTIATIONS

Washington, Jan. 9.—(AP)—Senator Thomas (Idaho) said today Secretary of State Hull had informed him that the state department would attempt to negotiate with Japan for the return of American citizens on the Pacific islands of Wake and Guam, now in enemy hands.

More than 600 Idaho residents were employed on the islands by the Morrison-Knudsen Construction company of Boise, Idaho, on defense projects, and Thomas wrote Hull about their case.

"Arrangements are being made on a reciprocal basis for the exchange of diplomatic missions," Hull wrote in reply.

"While an effort will be made to complete similar arrangements for the exchange of non-official Americans, no assurance has as yet been given that it will be possible to effect the return of Americans from the islands mentioned.

"You may, however, rest assured that this matter has the department's sincere and sympathetic attention and everything will be done that properly can be done to bring it to a successful conclusion."

GRID RULES CZARS EXPAND PASS RULE

Chicago, Jan. 9.—(AP)—A rule permitting two forward passes from behind the line of scrimmage on the same play was approved today by the football rules committee of the national federation of state high school athletic associations.

Under the former rule, a player could only run after receiving a forward pass. Now he will be able to either run, pass or kick as long as he remains behind the line of scrimmage.

Another rule adopted changed the penalty on pass interference. Formerly possession of the ball was given to the fouled team at the point of infraction, while the revision returns the ball to the line of scrimmage and then inflicts a 15-yard penalty on the guilty team.

Recall of Rossi Hinted in Filing

Sacramento, Jan. 9.—(AP)—A possible move to seek the removal of Mayor Angelo J. Rossi from his San Francisco office was indicated today with the filing of an application to reserve the corporate name, "recall Rossi and save San Francisco."

British Cruiser Victim of U-Boat

London, Jan. 9.—(AP)—The British cruiser Galatea, 5,720 tons, has been torpedoed and sunk by a U-boat, the admiralty announced tonight.

The Galatea was one of two cruisers of the 5,220-ton Arctura class and was completed in August, 1934. She carried a normal complement of 450 men.

First Day Service Leads to Hospital

Portland, Jan. 9.—(AP)—After one day's service in the marine corps, Albert Remington, 21, Miles City, Mont., was in the veterans' hospital here today.

The former Spokane accountant was sworn in at Seattle Wednesday, and Thursday was stricken with appendicitis while en route to the San Diego marine base.

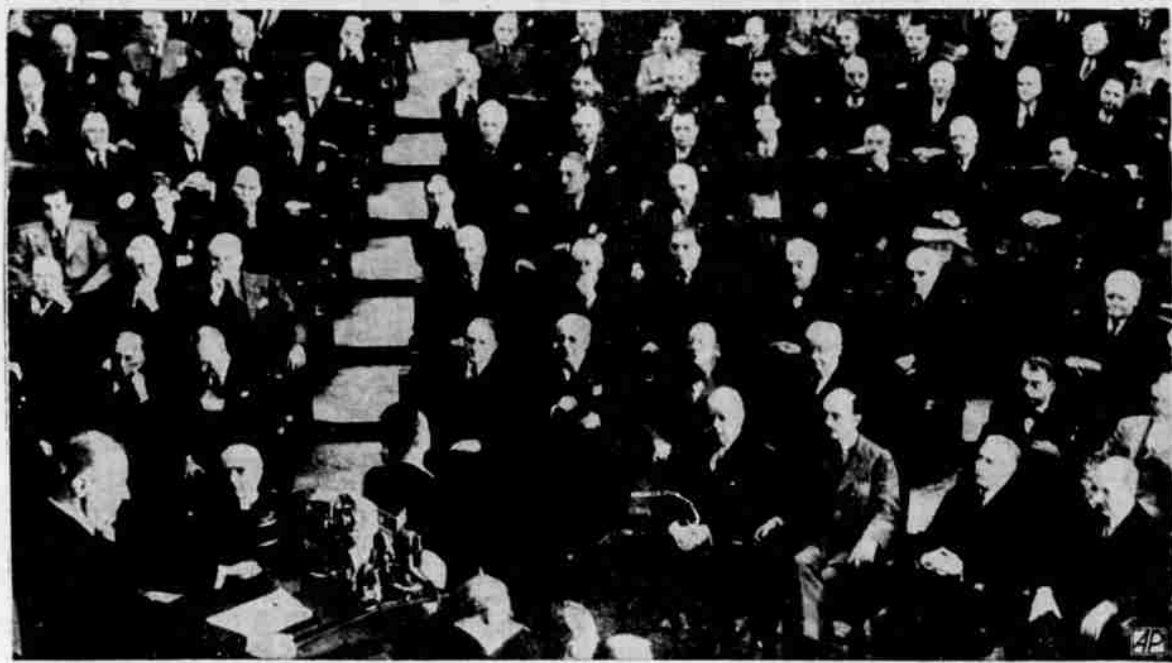

Civil Defense Change To Give Dean Landis More Responsibility

Washington, Jan. 9.—(AP)—A partial reorganization of the Office of Civilian Defense to give a large share of its responsibility to Dean James M. Landis of the Harvard law school, but with Mayor LaGuardia of New York continuing as director, was announced today by the White House.

Presidential Secretary Stephen Early said Landis would have the title of "executive" of the OCD and that he and LaGuardia would fashion, in consultation, broad matters of policy.

Early was asked whether Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt would continue as assistant director of the OCD and replied that he had heard nothing about the matter.

Landis is to be responsible for the creation of the necessary organization to effectuate the policies decided upon and for personnel to put the policies into effect.

Considerable criticism had developed in congress and elsewhere because LaGuardia was retaining both his job as mayor of the nation's largest city and directing the OCD.

Missing Airman Sought in Snow

Hanna, Wyo., Jan. 9.—(AP)—Eight bombing planes from Lowry field, Denver, scouted the rolling, treeless south central Wyoming range country today in search of a missing airman who parachuted with seven companions from an army bomber before it crashed last night.

Approximately 100 persons, some equipped with snowshoes and skis, joined Sheriff Glenn C. Penland in a widening search for the missing crewman, identified by army officers only as Second Lieut. Wolkling.

WAKE COST JAPS SEVEN WARSHIPS

Washington, Jan. 9.—(AP)—The navy announced late Thursday that additional reports from Wake Island brought the total of Japanese warships lost there to seven.

The total represented an increase of two, a destroyer and a gunboat, over the originally reported cruiser, submarine and three destroyers.

SMITH CLIPS PAR IN FIRST ROUND

Los Angeles, Jan. 9.—(AP)—Clipping four strokes off par, Horton Smith shot 68 today in the first round of the \$10,000 Los Angeles open golf tournament at Hillcrest Country club.

The Pinehurst, N. C., veteran established himself as a distinct threat for top money of \$3,500 when he toured the first nine in 33 and the last in 35 on the par 36-36 course.

Playing with Smith, Denny Shute of Chicago scored 36-35-71.

RAF Kindles Fires in Raid On Brest

London, Jan. 9.—(AP)—Numerous fires were left burning in the German-occupied naval base at Brest, France, after a strong RAF bombardment last night—the fourth consecutive night attack on that uneasy haven of the German battleships Scharnhorst and Gneisenau.

The air ministry communique also said that the docks at Cherbourg were bombed and acknowledged that two of the British planes failed to return.
