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ARMY BALLOON IS CAUSE POWER CUT; SEATTLE SCORED

Seattle, Jan. 14.—(P)—Seattle's power failure which yesterday tied up trackless trolleys, elevator service and radio stations for from three minutes to more than an hour in some places was caused by a loose army balloon which tangled with main power lines leading into the city, an army statement revealed.

The army statement said "a loose army balloon captive balloons broke loose while being tested. Army officers said the sudden gust of wind tore the balloons from their moorings. One of the balloons struck a power line, interrupting service and causing slight damage. All but one of them were recaptured and that one was last seen drifting toward the mountains to the east."

Many persons had been alarmed when power failed about 11 a. m. and radio stations went off the air. Shortly after restoration of power service an air raid siren was heard, adding to the alarm of citizens although it was merely being tested.

CONTROL OF VICE NEAR CAMPEYED

Salem, Ore., Jan. 14.—(P)—state board of health, complying with an army request that houses of prostitution adjacent to military establishments be closed, met here this afternoon to discuss measures for control of general disease in prostitutes.

Dr. Frederick D. Stricker, state health officer, explained that there are three phases to the vice problem, but that the board of health is interested only in the phase dealing with control of the general disease.

Dr. Stricker said the general disease problem would be acute after closure of the houses, because diseased girls then would take their place in society and thus would more readily spread the disease.

The health board will act to prevent such a spread, Dr. Stricker said.
