No Stamps Yet—Postmaster Frank DeSouza announced today he had received instructions regarding issuance of the federal motor vehicle stamps but no stamps. He expected the stamps to arrive momentarily. A special window for sale of the stamps will be opened until the peak of the expected business is over, he said, and then they will be sold at the regular stamp windows. The postmaster said there were about 11,000 motor vehicles in Jackson county. He did not know, however, whether cars and trucks not actually in use had to have the stamps. Effective date of this new tax is February 1.

CENSORSHIP CODE ISSUED TO PRESS; BARS MUCH DATA

Washington, Jan. 15.—(AP)—American newspapers, magazines and similar organs of information today had an official outline from the office of censorship of publication "practices which the government feels are desirable for the effective prosecution of the war."

The code, issued by Byron Price, director of censorship, calls for withholding publication of "certain classes of information which might be of aid to the enemy."

In general, the ban falls on the publication of ship, plane and troop movements, specifications and locations of fortifications, bomb shelters and camouflage objects; specific information concerning production of war material; general weather information and photographs or maps disclosing military information of any kind. Also barred is news concerning movements of the president, and casualty lists other than in a publication's local file.

J. H. Sorrells, assistant director of censorship, will administer the code.

Chicago, Jan. 15.—(AP)—Profit taking attracted wheat prices near peaks since 1937 and hedging sales to offset purchases of grain from the commodity credit corporation choked off a temporary rise in the cereal market here today.

Wheat closed unchanged to 1/4 lower than yesterday, May \$1.31-1.30 1/2; July \$1.22 1/4-1/2; corn unchanged to 1/4 off, May \$0.84-85, July \$0.74-75; oats unchanged to 1/4 up; rye unchanged to 1/4 lower; soybeans 2-2 1/4 higher. Soybeans were up as much as 3 cents at one time due to short covering and buying attributed to processors.

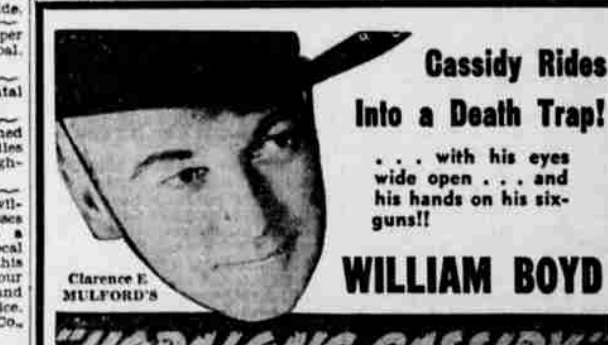
