

PRODUCTION CZAR WILL HAVE FULL POWER SAYS FDR

Washington, Jan. 16.—(AP)—President Roosevelt was said on high authority today to have made it unmistakably clear to those concerned that he intends to vest in Donald Nelson, chief of the new war production board, the final decision on all production and supply matters.

Members of congress have been waiting anxiously for issuance of an executive order formally outlining Nelson's duties. Some of the legislators had expressed fear that the president might not delegate such broad authority to Nelson as was indicated in the first announcement of creation of the new board.

There have been reports that agencies within the present defense set-up had raised objections to subordinating their authority over certain phases of the program. Some army and navy officials were said to have complained privately at the prospect that a civilian would have the final word on vital matters of production and supply.

But one well informed official said there was no doubt that Mr. Roosevelt would insist at the start that Nelson be the boss.

GUAM PRISONERS TOLD TO BEHAVE

Tokyo, Jan. 16.—(Official broadcast recorded by AP)—Major General Yoshishige Dizuara, commanding officer of the internment camp on Shikoku island, told his 442 American war prisoners today they must behave according to the Japanese military code and without the "traditional Anglo-American sense of superiority for Asiatics."

The prisoners include Captain George J. McMillin, who was governor of Guam. Dizuara assured the prisoners they would be treated fairly.
