

REICHENAU, NAZI FIELD MARSHAL, APOPLEXIC VICTIM

Famous Commander Pres-
ent War Stricken On
Way Home From East
Front.

Berlin, Jan. 17. — (Official
Broadcast Recorded by AP) —
Field Marshal General Walter
Von Reichenau, who since June
22 had commanded a German
army on the southern wing of
the sweep into the Ukraine, has
fallen to a fatal stroke of apo-
plexy while returning from the
Eastern front, said an announce-
ment today.

(The death of Von Reichenau
will involve a further reorgani-
zation of the German high com-
mand, which roundabout reports
say has been underway since the
removal on December 19 of the
commander-in-chief, Field Mar-
shal Gen. Walter Von Brauch-
itsch and the personal ascendancy
of Adolf Hitler as supreme
commander.)

(Von Reichenau was a protégé
of Marshal Werner Von Blom-
berg, who was ousted as minister
of war in 1938 ostensibly be-
cause of an injudicious marriage
but reportedly because of a split
in the high command over the
advisability of invading Austria
— a coup which Adolf Hitler car-
ried through soon after.)

(Col. Gen. Werner Von Fritsch,
commander-in-chief of the army,
who went out in the same shake-
up, later was killed at Warsaw
in Poland. The official an-
nouncement said he was killed
in action while leading the re-
giment of which he had been made
an honorary commander. It has
been rumored that in reality Von
Fritsch sought death. He was
given a state funeral.)

Adolf Hitler at once appointed
Reichsmarschal Hermann Goering
to represent him as fuhrer at a
state funeral for the 57-year old
Von Reichenau, it was an-
nounced.

From an old family of German
generals, Von Reichenau was
one of the most famous com-
manders in the present war.

Appointed commander-in-chief
of army group four in 1938, he
led the Germans into Czecho-
Slovakia and occupied Prague in
1939. As commander of the
tenth army he marched into
Poland from Silesia, on the right
wing of the German advance, in
September of that year, showing
great personal bravery, he swam
the Vistula river at the head of
his troops, German war corre-
spondents reported.

He was the commander of the
sixth army which advanced into
Belgium and France in May,
1940, winning his greatest fame
in that campaign with his direc-
tion of operations about en-
circled Belgians, British and
French at Dunkerque.

For these services he was
awarded the Knights Cross of
the Iron Cross after the Polish
campaign, and was promoted to
field marshal after the French
campaign.

THOUSANDS MORE GARDENS PLANNED

Corvallis, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Thou-
sands more gardens than now
planned are needed in Oregon
this season to increase the home
food supply so that more of
commercial production can go
to the armed forces and to
America's allies.

So declared state agricultural
and civilian defense leaders in
a state-wide garden conference
presided over by Dean W. A.
Schoenfeld of the OSC agricul-
ture school.

However, they urged only
persons who know how to at-
tempt gardens. Ray Gill, state
Grange master, advised against
wholesale digging up of lawns
and flower gardens by urbanites
who know nothing about raising
vegetables. They will, he said,
waste seed and fertilizer and
raise nothing.
