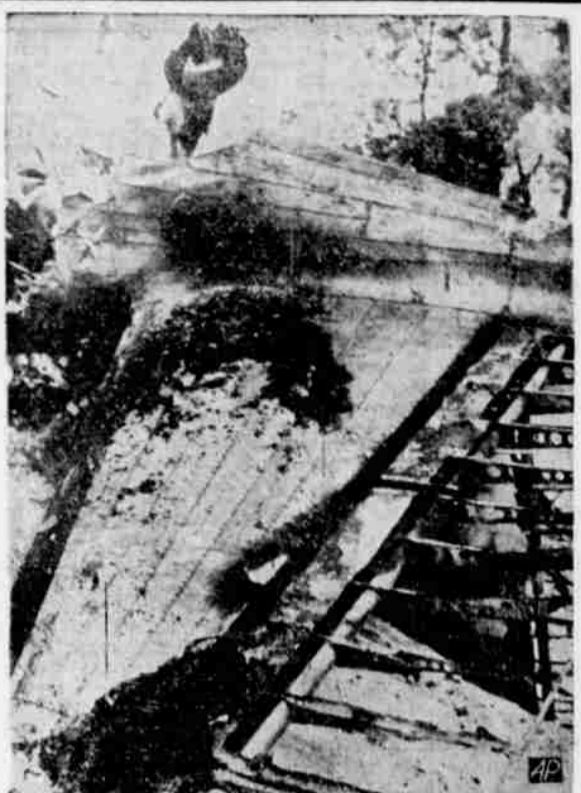
Pythian Sisters Hold Dinner Tonight

FAMED CAROLINIAN GOES TO REWARD
 Columbia, S. C., Jan. 20.—(P)—Coleman L. Blease, 73, who as governor of South Carolina issued nearly 3,000 pardons and as U. S. senator opposed the League of Nations, died last night. He underwent an operation Saturday.
 He was an almost perennial candidate for public office in South Carolina from 1890 to 1938. He served in the senate from 1925 to 1931.
 Blease bitterly attacked America's entry into the first world war and President Woodrow Wilson's policies. In 1926 he prevented a senate vote on a resolution of adherence to the world court by conducting a one-man filibuster.
 He was South Carolina governor from 1911 to 1915 and gained national prominence by use of the pardoning power.

Retail Gas Prices Will Be Ceiled if Increase Is Tried

Washington, Jan. 20.—(P)—Retail dealers in all grades of gasoline received notice from Price Administrator Leon Henderson today that their prices must remain at or below the level of last November 7 or a price ceiling will be imposed.
 The warning was contained in a general letter to producers, refiners and marketers of petroleum products clarifying price questions on petroleum and a list of specified petroleum products which temporarily are pegged at the November 7 level.
 While gasoline sold at service stations, curbside pumps, marine service stations and other retail outlets was not formally included in the list of affected products, Henderson's letter said: "It must be understood, however, that these prices should remain substantially at or below November 7 levels. If they do not, a formal ceiling order will be promulgated placing them under full control."

Frisco Supervisors In Protection Plea

San Francisco, Jan. 20.—(P)—The San Francisco county board of supervisors urged congress today to provide the Pacific coast with a system of invincible defense, strong enough to defy any attempted Japanese bombing or invasion.
 A resolution it adopted was similar to those approved by other Pacific coast cities.
