with the federal government but specific instructions would have to come from Portland headquarters, and Seth Bullis, district manager of the operating department of the California Oregon Power company, said the company would "do what is necessary."

One observer said that the county court and other state governmental subdivisions would probably be guided by the attitude adopted at Salem, the capital. Although the county court was in session, Judge Coleman said its attitude could not be obtained in time for publication today.

It was pointed out that in all probability there would be general adherence to the daylight-saving time schedule as otherwise there would be much confusion, with interstate commerce and federal activities, such as postoffices, forest service offices, park service offices, O-C office and others, operating on the new time set-up while intrastate business was conducted on the old schedule.
