HURLING PLANE CRASHES IN PARK
Richmond, Calif., Jan. 21-(AP) One of the army's fastest pursuit planes came whistling 9,000 feet out of a clear sky late yesterday and crashed into a Richmond city park with an impact which shook the ground for miles around.

Second Lieut. Richard J. Sandner, 24, of Moccasin, Calif., pilot of the single-seater, was burned almost beyond recognition.

The P-40 from Hamilton field struck a clump of eucalyptus trees in Alvarado Gardens, just within the city limits and a mile from a busy highway, with such force it sheared off three trees and scattered plane parts for hundreds of yards.

SLIGHT DECREASE IN OREGON GOLD
San Francisco, Jan. 21-(AP) Nevada led western states in increasing output of copper, zinc and lead in 1941, but total value of five principal west coast metals declined.

The drop resulted principally from a lower output of gold in California, which was \$50,948,000 in 1940 and \$49,313,000 in 1941.

Oregon's gold output decreased slightly from \$3,969,000 to \$3,311,000. Oregon silver production was up from \$155,813 to \$196,267.

Seldom, if ever, has there been a screen program so complete as that opening a four day engagement today at the Craterian theatre.

Loss of Mozhaisk May Bring More Disaster To Shivering Germans

The Russian capture of Mozhaisk, opposite Moscow, is a victory of major importance and one which may well expand into further great successes in the immediate future.

Mozhaisk, which sits astride the Moscow-Smolensk railway, has been the anchor for the center of the Nazi winter defense line. The Germans had fortified this key position heavily and were depending on it mightily for their spring offensive which would be calculated to make an early capture of the Soviet capital.

With the fall of Mozhaisk, however, the whole German center-hundreds of miles of the fighting-line up and down the Moscow sector-presumably will be forced to pull back to a great depth in order to straighten the front, for this town lay at the apex of a great salient which the invaders had driven into the Red defense. Indeed, the Muscovites report that the Hitlerites are retreating along the Smolensk road to tragic Napoleonic memories.

Withdrawal of a big army under enemy pressure is always a desperate undertaking. It is doubly so when it has to be engineered through deep snows and in sub-zero weather, particularly for troops which are un-equipped for such weather and now have been deprived of their shelter of winter quarters and must shift for themselves in the death-dealing winds of the steppe.

The position is one which certainly holds potential disaster for the Nazis. It depends on whether the Russians are able to exploit their capture of Mozhaisk before the Germans are able to retire to fresh positions and re-establish their line.

Extension of the Japanese attack to Burma is most disquieting.

Were the Japs able to gain control of Burma they would at once cut the Burma road and thereby fairly well isolate China from the outside world, and would have gained a powerful base for operations against India.

Loss of the Burma road obviously would be a catastrophe for the allies in the far east since it would cut the Chinese off from their main supply route. And today the Chinese press is appealing to the United States and Britain for huge quantities of war materials.

But beyond this, there is small doubt that the Japanese are getting set for a possible attempt to wrest the Indian empire from Britain. That has been one of Nippon's great dreams for long years. It's been one of Germany's for that matter.

Aviation Cavalcade Featuring Exploits Air Pioneers Coming
It was announced today that the sensational featurette, "Cavalcade of Aviation," has been booked into the Rialto theatre for showing next Tuesday and Wednesday, January 27 and 28.

Produced by the Universal Pictures company, the featurette will play in addition to the two regular features which will be announced later.

"Cavalcade of Aviation," entertainingly presents the history of aviation from the Wright brothers to our present day "flying fortresses." It brings to the screen in kaleidoscopic review a thrilling story of an industry which may still be in its infancy but which in less than 40 years brought Europe and other far places almost to our front door and has brought a new deadliness to the wars of men.

Shown is the first plane and the men who built it-Orrville and Wilbur Wright. To now, we are able to see the actual pictures filmed at the first flight of the Wright brothers at Kittyhawk, N. C., in December, 1903, is magic indeed. Other scenes in the first part of the film show Glenn Curtiss and Harriet Quimby in early-type planes.

The film takes the audience through the war of 1914 and shows Captain Eddie Rickenbacker maneuvering one of the then famous Spad planes. Under the stress of war the plane developed quickly and one of the highlights of the film are the numerous "freak" planes and plane inventions that, at the time, looked hopeless, but which tended to bring about some of our great present-day bombers.

The great aviators of our time are shown, including Amelia Earhart, Ruth Elder, Byrd, Chamberlain, Lindberg and many others.

On the tragedy side there is the tragic flight of Wiley Post and Will Rogers who perished in Alaska; the escape of the Dirigible Akron with ground crew hanging to the ropes and dropping off to their death; the burning of the Hindenburg; and the crackup of the DiPenedo attempt to fly the ocean.

The film climaxes with today's fighting over Europe and the Pacific, and preparation in the United States to give this country the defense it needs-in short, America's answer to the Hitler and Jap aggression.
