

DEFENSE SAVINGS PLEDGE CAMPAIGN IN HOME STRETCH

Canvassers In Effort To
Reach Every Family
Throughout Jackson Co.

The national defense savings bond pledge campaign entered the home stretch today as weary volunteer canvassers continued their house-to-house calling in an effort to reach every family in Jackson county this week.

Canvassers report a favorable attitude by the public throughout the county, practically everyone being helpful and courteous even in cases where no pledge can be made at this time. The aim of the campaign is to give Uncle Sam an indication of how much defense money he may expect to pour in with regularity and everyone is being asked to pledge voluntarily only such amounts as it is reasonable to expect can be met at weekly or monthly intervals.

No Obligation
There is a place on the pledge card to show whether bonds and stamps are being purchased through some systematic plan, such as payroll deductions and newspaper carriers. The pledge campaign director, Moore Hamilton, asks that everyone making such purchases cooperate by letting the canvassers make this notation on the pledge cards. Some persons have been reluctant to do this, Mr. Hamilton said, emphasizing again that there is no obligation involved, the idea being merely to show how much the government can reasonably expect to receive from bond and stamp sales.

The pledge workers in Phoenix today requested persons who might have been missed to report to any canvasser by next Monday night.

FREEDOM'S FOOD TO BE TOPIC AT FARMER MEETING

"Food for Freedom" will be theme of the eighth annual meeting of Medford Production Credit association to be held here Monday, with sessions opening in the courthouse auditorium at 10 a. m. The program will show work of the association in helping its members finance increased production in line with the "food for freedom" movement of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Relation of agricultural finance and production of food for freedom will be the topic of A. B. Robertson, Spokane, vice president of the corporation, who will deliver the principal address. Another speaker will be Earl T. Newberry, Medford farmer, who will talk on agricultural labor problems. In addition a farm credit administration film "Food for Freedom" will be shown.

At noon association members and guests will have lunch at St. Marks parish house on North Oakdale. The session will close with balloting for two board members to replace Clarence Zumwalt, Sixes, and Jesse Clinton, Myrtle Point, whose terms have expired. The meeting here is for Jackson and Josephine members of the association and the following day the program is to be repeated at Roseburg for members from Douglas, Coos and Curry counties. Ballots taken here will be sealed and counted with those at Roseburg, where results will be announced.

Plan Negro Division As Expansion Phase Of U. S. Armed Force

Washington, Jan. 23.—(AP)—Formation of a sixth armored division and of the first entire division of infantry composed of Negro troops was announced today by Secretary Stimson as a part of the army's current expansion to 3,600,000 men.

The war secretary reported at the same time that a second air force pursuit squadron composed of Negro fliers also had been ordered created.

The new 6th armored division will be organized at Fort Knox, Ky., early in February and later moved to a permanent station whose location was not announced.

PENNY-A-PLANE BRINGS \$104.05

The Redmen and Pocahontas lodges, jointly sponsoring the "penny-a-plane" plan here, yesterday mailed a money order for \$104.05 to the secretary of war for use in paying for fighter planes.

This sum was collected in the pennies deposited by the public during the first week in the 100 cans placed about town, the lodges announced today. The idea is to contribute the same number of pennies as enemy planes shot down by Americans the previous days. A sign on the cans tells the number.

The collections are in charge of Velma Singler and Esther Dooms. Every cent deposited in the cans is being sent to the secretary of war, the lodges paying for any incidental expenses such as the cost of the money orders, it was emphasized. The "penny-a-plane" plan is being carried out in all parts of the country under various local sponsorships.
