SHOP OWNERS TO ORGANIZE POOL FOR WAR ORDERS

Meeting Friday Will Mark Concerted Effort To Secure Defense Contracts

Plans for the organization of a pool of small shops and orders to seek government war contracts will be consummated at a meeting of the top floor of city hall, Frank Hull, manager of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce announced today. Mr. Hull said that all owners and managers of small shops and plants and automobile dealers of Jackson and Josephine counties ought to attend the meeting tomorrow if they are at all interested in getting government contracts or sub-contracts. Everyone who can help in producing wood, metal or other articles for war uses was urged by Mr. Hull to be present.

Board Head Coming The meeting will be attended by John G. Barnett, manager of the Portland office of the contract distribution branch, production division, war production board. Mr. Barnett will bring with him from Portland the office expert on pool organization and an engineer to help the local men get their association set up and ready to bid for government orders, Mr. Hull said. The small shop and plant owners met at the chamber of commerce again this morning to continue preliminary arrangements for forming the pool, the meeting being a continuation of a similar session held yesterday afternoon at which the car dealers found a place in the set-up. The auto dealers will contribute skilled mechanics, tools and equipment as well as proportionate capital to the pool, it was explained. The meeting this morning named a committee to complete details of the pool before tomorrow's meeting with Mr. Barnett and his associates.

ASHLAND FIRMS GET NOTICE OF HIGHWAY CHANGE

Ashland, Jan. 29.—(Sp)—The signal for action in the long-awaited straightening of the Ashland plaza corner in the Pacific highway came yesterday in the form of official notices for owners and tenants of affected property to vacate their buildings by April 1. Presumably, work in demolishing and reconstructing buildings along the plaza will commence immediately after that date. Most of the buildings from Oak street on E. Main to Water street on N. Main will be eliminated by the highway modernization project.

Major reconstruction project, involving present buildings, will involve the H. L. Claycomb property adjacent to Water street. Two buildings there, housing the Claycomb and Beare Motor companies, will be rebuilt to accommodate the new highway.

Also, there appears the possibility that the buildings housing the Billings Agency and J. D. Mars and Son shoe shop might be partially used, with the rear parts of present buildings remodeled. However, most of the present buildings, occupied by the Log Cabin, Postal Telegraph company, Robison Real Estate office, Mitchell's Barber Shop, Herbert Grocery store, No-Delay cafe and Harrison Paris company, will be completely razed. Tenants, necessarily, must seek other locations for their businesses.
