ORDER CIVILIAN PILOTS GROUNDED

Seattle, Jan. 31.—(AP)—The second interceptor command issued an order today grounding civilian aircraft in western Washington and western Oregon west of the Cascade mountains.

Civilian pilots in this area were told by the army authorities they must cease flying immediately. The army also blocked off a new large defense area in north-east Washington adjoining the Canadian border over which civilians may not fly. In Washington state that left only central, east central and southeast Washington open to private planes.

The only exceptions made to the rule was that regular commercial airlines might continue to fly into Seattle and local civilian pilot training courses might continue until February 7 but not thereafter.
