EIGHT SENIORS FINISH STUDIES AT HIGH SCHOOL

32 Transfer From Junior High To Senior High—Increase in Enrollment.

Completing their three years of senior high school studies at mid-year and not returning for the start of the second semester this morning were eight graduating seniors. One other, Anne VanValzah, finished her high school course the first semester but registered this morning to continue her studies.

The eight were Arthur Dunford, Ernest Ludwig, Milton Pitts, Clifford Quigley, Arthur Satterlee and Weldon Zundell. Pitts and Quigley left school some time ago to join the navy, having completed their studies ahead of time. Diplomas will be awarded the mid-year graduates at regular spring graduation exercises.

Mid-year transfers from the junior high's 9A class to the sophomore class at senior high school numbered 32, and the identical number of 8A grade school students took up their 7B studies in junior high this morning.

Beginning their studies in the 1B were 48 little pupils, 13 at Lincoln, 12 at Jackson, 11 at Roosevelt and 10 at Washington grade schools.

The total Medford public school enrollment on the first day of the second semester was 2,349, an increase of 64 over the 2,285 total for the same period last year.

Klamath Falls, Feb. 2.—(P)—There were plenty of cold feet here Saturday night in a cop-and-robber chase that saw two men swim across snow-banked streams.

The hitch-hiker, armed with a gun, commandeered an automobile driven by H. H. Norton, Eugene, but ran into a ditch within 200 yards. He fled into the woods.

Sheriff Lloyd Low said Klamath Indian reservation officers went in chase, and jailed a sopping wet man identified as John C. Tuttle, 22, Bend, who admitted swimming Crooked creek twice before being arrested.

Low said the money was recovered.

CALIFORNIA BOYS ARRESTED HERE IN AUTO THEFTS

Five California youths, ranging in age from 13 to 15, were arrested by state police here late Saturday night in possession of a stolen car, and within three hours were enroute back to California in the company of Siskiyou county deputy sheriffs, who came here to take them into custody.

The boys, state police said, gave their names as Calvin S. Tilley, 15 and Albert A. Tilley, 14, both of Marysville; Leon S. Mackey 14 and Mervin Knouse, 13, also of Marysville, and Alton Clendenin, 13, of Yuba City.

Police arrested the five youngsters in a service station at Riverside avenue and Sixth street about 10:45 p. m., while they were in possession of a 1934 Ford sedan owned by O. M. Young of route 4. Under questioning they admitted stealing the car in Ashland, police stated.

Retracing their trail since leaving Marysville about 4 p. m. last Friday, the youths told police they walked to Yuba City where they stole a 1938 Olds coupe and drove to Yreka, stopping near Chico to steal five gallons of gasoline from a farm tractor.

They abandoned the Olds in Yreka, police said they related, and stole a Chevrolet station wagon there early Saturday night. Two miles north of the Oregon-California line they threw out a large mail sack, police said they recalled, and then drove into Ashland where the station wagon was abandoned and the Ford sedan stolen. Police said the station wagon was not a federal vehicle, but probably was owned by a contract mail carrier.

Calvin S. Tilley, driver of the stolen cars, told police he was on probation in California for the previous theft of three automobiles.

stood to have in mind a 1,000-unit trailer camp, though at first definite plans were to be made to accommodate a smaller number, say 200. Development would be undertaken as the need was indicated.

The coordinating board's office emphasized that even a 1,000-unit trailer camp would be only a "drop in the bucket" so far as housing is concerned. When camp construction starts, Medford housing is expected to be taxed beyond capacity and with this in mind the coordinating board today implored all residents to look over their homes again to see if some room cannot be fixed up for occupancy by construction workers or others brought here by the camp. Hospitals Advised

A press release received here today from the office of information, federal works agency, said that hospitals "should go just as far as they can in arranging their own financing programs without waiting for hoped-for aid from defense public works grants or loans."
