## SUPPLY OF WATER SAME AS 1941, IS PRESENT OUTLOOK

In the Medford and Rogue River irrigation districts, water stored in reservoirs, water stored in snow and watershed soil-stored moisture combine now to forecast an available 1942 water supply approximately the same as last year, according to a report made today by the Oregon cooperative snow surveys, division of irrigation of the department of agriculture.

The outlook last year for irrigation water supplies, the report says, was far below average and only above-the-normal valley rainfall during the early growing season prevented a serious late season shortage.

Prospects for the water supply of the Talent district are better than for other nearby areas, and the outlook there is for an adequate 1942 supply, very much better than last year.

So far as the lower Rogue at Grants Pass is concerned the present prospects are for no greater low summer flow than last year.

The report further says the outlook for irrigation water supplies for the state as a whole is now very much better than last year at this time, particularly in the area near Bend.

The report was made by Arch Work and Ed Judd of the division of irrigation, covering this section. Final snow measurements for the year will be made around April 10, and it is stressed it is too early for final snow estimates.

## U. S. Technicians On Voyage to Ireland

London, March 10.—(AP)—Large transports carrying a group of United States technicians, hundreds of airmen from Canadian training camps and Canadian army reinforcements, have arrived at a British port in a convoy which at least once dropped depth charges against suspected submarines, it was announced today.

The Americans were bound for United States bases in northern Ireland.

Polish, Norwegian and Belgian fighting men also were aboard.

## DEPUTY KILLED

Portland, Ore., March 10.—(AP)—Charles Richton, 67, chief deputy sheriff here since December, 1930, was killed this morning by a bullet from a .32 caliber automatic he was cleaning. Fellow workers found him in the private office of Sheriff Martin T. Pratt. He died before medical aid could be summoned.

## Millions of Women Must Enter Plants For Defense Work

Washington, March 10.—(AP)—An official war inventory of the nation's human resources declared today that millions of women would have to be shifted from housework to munitions factories in the expansion of war industries.

The survey was made by the bureau of census. It contained no specific mention of proposals that American women be drafted into factories as women are in England, but asserted:

"The maximum movement into the male labor force can hardly exceed 2,000,000 men. A larger expansion of the total labor supply evidently can be achieved only by drawing millions of women into the labor force."

The report said that 25,600,000 housewives between 18 and 44 years old represented the principal reserve from which additional war labor might be drawn.

## EDUCATION BOARD WEIGHS PROBLEMS

Portland, March 10.—(AP)—Present and future financial problems hung over the deliberations of the state board of higher education at its March meeting today attended by all members.

Chancellor Frederick M. Hunter reported possibility of federal aid for institutions and students in accelerating the training of men in fields vital to the war effort. He added that falling enrollments and rising costs will play havoc with annual budgets due at the April meeting.

The board received "for further study" the chancellor's comprehensive report and recommendations for an outline of wartime and post-war procedure for the system institutions, when E. C. Sammons, head of the finance committee, held that conditions are too uncertain to adopt formally such long-time policies.

## Pendleton Trailer Camp Has Approval

Pendleton, March 10.—(AP)—Approval has been received here for a 100-unit trailer camp to relieve the acute housing shortage. The project will be started soon under direction of the national housing administration.

Action on the camp followed closely a request by Col. Frank W. Wright, commander of Pendleton field, for 100 trailers and dormitory facilities for 100 men.

## ENLISTMENT BEST COMMISSION PATH

The best way for men 18 to 20 years old to become commissioned officers in the U. S. army is to enlist immediately, Lieut. Col. B. H. Hensley, Portland, Oregon district recruiting officer, said in a press release received today.

Col. Hensley said that "first come, first served" would be the rule with selections for the 75,000 additional commissions to be assigned as rapidly as possible. All men who have completed four months of service, which includes the 13 weeks' basic training period, may apply for appointment to an officer candidate school, he stated. Selections are made on the basis of the applicant's record in civil life and his record during service in the ranks.

## TAX PROGRAM IN STORMY WEATHER

Washington, March 10.—(AP)—House ways and means committee opposition to Secretary Morgenthau's new tax program became so widespread today that members began to predict that his goal of \$7,610,000,000 in new revenue would not be achieved.

They said that no one could yet tell whether the committee would accept the treasury secretary's principal recommendations for raising more than \$8,000,000,000 in greatly-increased individual and corporate taxes, but they said clear-cut opposition had developed to less important suggestions. Hearings on the program continued today.

## FIVE YEARS IN PEN FOR STEALING TIRES

Boonville, Mo., Mar. 10.—(AP)—Two men were sentenced to five years each in the state penitentiary today after pleading guilty to stealing 25 tires and seven tubes from a filling station. They are William J. Lipscomb and Buck Parker. The tires and tubes valued at \$189, were recovered.

## Demotion of Leader In Ambulance Corps Creates Dissension

Los Angeles, March 10.—(AP)—Dissension divided the women's ambulance and defense corps today.

Col. John W. Colbert, national commander, removed Comdr. Dorothy Hewes Bell as Los Angeles leader "because of inefficiency" at a meeting of 750 WADC members last night.

"The officers and members of the four units under her command were not properly trained. . . I am not going to allow club politics and friendship to deter us in the job of preparing the women of the corps for service," Col. Colbert said.

Comdr. Bell said she had been offered a demotion by the board of directors, but declined.

After Col. Colbert's dismissal announcement was read over a loud speaker, the women were ordered to their classes. Some Bell followers estimated as many as 300 walked out instead.
