London, March 10.—(AP)—Reuters heard the Vichy radio broadcast today that Gen. Otto Van Schaumburg, military governor of Paris, had announced that 20 persons described as communists and Jews had been shot to death as a reprisal for the slaying of a German sentry March 1.

## LITTLE CITY OF AUTO TRAILERS AT COUNTY CAMP

The Jackson county trailer camp on the Crater Lake highway is rapidly becoming a modern little city. Workmen have completed installation of the lighting system wherein each trailer is attached to the main line for individual service.

Rapid progress has been made on installation of the laundry and bath houses and it is expected that they will be in complete operation tomorrow. Hot and cold water and laundry facilities are furnished tenants of the camp. A 1,000 gallon hot water tank assures an ample supply for the showers housed in a special building.

Through courtesy of the Forest Service department 25 tents were loaned to the camp to house workers unable to secure accommodations in the city. It is also planned to set aside a portion of the camp site for persons who may wish to erect temporary quarters of their own in case of an acute housing shortage.

The committee in charge of the camp for the county emphasizes that their plan is only to take care of whatever overflow private facilities are unable to handle and that trailers should be sent to the county camp after private facilities are filled. Because of state health and sanitary regulations no trailers will be allowed to park along streams or in vacant lots without adequate water and sewer facilities.
