DRAFT LOTTERY
TO START 3 P. M.
ON MARCH 17

Washington, March 11.—(AP)—Selective service officials today set 3 p. m. Pacific war time, as the hour for starting March 17 the draft lottery which will determine the order of liability for service of an estimated 9,000,000 men who registered February 16.

Officials said that Secretary of War Stimson had been asked to draw the first capsule in the lottery, the third since enactment of the selective service law, but the first since war was declared. President Roosevelt, who drew the first number in the first lottery, will not attend the third drawing.

All the February 16 registrants—men aged 20 to 44 inclusive who had not previously registered—now are being assigned serial numbers. Capsules bearing these numbers will be drawn in the lottery from a gold fish bowl and the order in which they are drawn will determine the registrant's order number.

Officials said further details of the lottery will be announced later in the week.

RADIO EXPERTS
SOUGHT BY NAVY

Lieut. Herbert E. Wigle and a medical officer will come to Medford about April 15 to interview and examine applicants for appointment as naval reserve officers in a specialized branch of the navy involving ultra high-frequency radio and electronics, the office of naval officer procurement in Seattle notified the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce today. Meantime applicants were invited to register at the chamber of commerce.

Applicants appointed to a commission will receive five months of special training in ultra high-frequency radio and electronics. Physically qualified men between 18 and 50 years of age are sought. While electrical

RADIOS SILENCED
IN LOS ANGELES

Los Angeles, March 11.—(AP)—A 57-minute radio blackout in three southern California counties was lifted at 7 a. m. (PWT) today, but the fourth interceptor command declined any comment.

A "blue" alert, mobilizing air raid wardens and silencing radios, was ordered here and in Orange and Ventura counties at 6:03 a. m. (PWT). At the same time, San Diego was given a preliminary, or "yellow" alert.

It was the first radio silencing in nearly two weeks, since the entire metropolitan area was blacked out and anti-aircraft guns fired for a half-hour Feb. 25 at what Secretary of War Stimson said was a flight of enemy commercial airplanes.

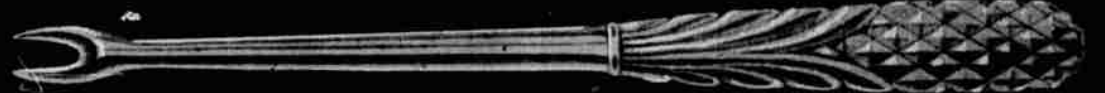
