MEDFORD ITALIAN IN FBI CUSTODY

Portland, March 12—(P)—An Italian national from the Medford area, said to have had contraband articles in his possession, was held here today, J. Douglas Swenson, FBI chief, reported.

U. S. Attorney Carl C. Donough said the alien enemy hearing board has completed studying the cases of four Italians and nine Germans arrested earlier.

This is the second case of an alien of enemy nationality being taken into custody in the Medford area, a German having been previously detained. FBI officials make a practice of not disclosing names pending hearings. Searches for contraband were made at a number of homes in this area yesterday.

Gandhi Unimpressed By British Proposal

Wardha, India, March 12—(P)—Despite the British government's announcement of plans for post-war dominion status for India, the supreme leader of Hindu nationalists, Mohandas K. Gandhi, professed today to see no sign of settlement for the Indian question.
The frail little man who renounced the title of Mahatma (saintly one) and even formal leadership of the All-India congress party, said in an interview that Britain must confess "the greatest crime against India"—which he defined as imperialism—and undo it.

CROSS-SECTION OF AMERICAN LIFE IN ARMY SAYS BISHOP

The American army is a cross-section of American life, the Right Rev. Benjamin D. Dagwell, Portland, Episcopal bishop for Oregon, said in a talk before the weekly luncheon-meeting of the Lions club in the Hotel Medford Wednesday.

Bishop Dagwell said he was not concerned with the influence the cantonment being built here would have on Medford but the influence Medford would have on the cantonment. Pointing out that the American army is not professional, he emphasized that, just as in civilian life, a butcher, a baker, a doctor or a mechanic, when a soldier, will enjoy the same associations whenever they are available, at the cantonment or in Medford.

Bishop Dagwell referred to the unity of purpose attained by this country in prosecuting the war. "Selfish motives are held aside, everything we hold dear is at stake and therefore we can no longer seek a life of ease."

Bishop Dagwell came here on behalf of the solicitation of funds for the enlargement of the Medford Episcopal church and expanded recreational facilities for the soldiers who will occupy Camp White.

MAJOR DISTILLERS ACCUSED OF FIXING PRICES ON LIQUOR

Denver, March 12—(P)—Nine-teen major distilling companies were accused today of raising and fixing liquor prices in Colorado in a federal grand jury indictment that also named eight wholesale liquor firms, two dealer associations, and 54 individuals.

John Porter, special assistant to the attorney general, said the maximum penalty for conviction under the indictment would be a \$5,000 fine for corporations and a \$5,000 fine and one year's imprisonment for individuals.

J. Biehoff Products Co., Chicago; Garrett & Company, Inc., Brooklyn; the American Distilling Co., New York; Somerset Importers, Ltd., New York, and East-Side Winery, Lodi, Calif.
