'SINKING' FUND AID IN SALE OF BONDS

Bakersfield, Cal. (UP)—Social science classes at Kern county Union high school, after classroom discussions of the subject, perfected a successful "sinking" fund plan for the purchase of national defense bonds.

A secretary has been elected to keep track of all airplanes and ships lost by the Allies, and the students will undertake to aid in their replacements.

The rates have been set low, so that everyone will be able to contribute by merely cutting down on his lunch money if necessary.

According to the "sinking fund" scale, students will contribute 10 cents for every battleship sunk, 10 cents for every aircraft carrier, one cent for every submarine, one cent for every destroyer, two cents for every cruiser, one cent for every transport, and one cent for every 10 airplanes.

The adult rate for teachers and others who want to participate will be 10 times the student rate.

During the first month that the plan was in operation, a total of \$191.05 was placed in the fund.

DRAWS PAY ONLY ONCE IN LIFETIME

Seekonk, Mass. (UP)—During his 85 years of life, farmer Bob Woodward has drawn a pay envelope only once.

That was in 1929 when he served on a jury—from which he ultimately was excused so that he and his wife could celebrate their golden wedding anniversary.

As a lad of 15, Farmer Woodward earned his first pay, "geeing" and "hawing" a yoke of oxen over a milk route.

The route took 150 quarts of milk and customers used to "put out anything for a saucer to an empty pot for the milk and paid from five to six cents a quart."

SIGN HOP CONTRACTS
Portland, March 13.—(P)—Prices ranged from 45 cents to 37 cents per pound for seedless hops on a number of contracts written in Oregon for 1942 hops during the past week, the agriculture department disclosed today. The market generally was quiet, but steady to firm.

CON DRIVES AWAY
Walla Walla, March 13.—(P)—Driving away in a penitentiary truck, George Leroy Wall, about 27, a trusty serving a burglary sentence from King county, escaped from the Washington state prison yesterday. He was the first inmate to escape this year.

ZOO GEARED FOR AIR RAID DANGER

Philadelphia (UP)—Thirty animals in the Philadelphia zoo are listed for death if air raids over the city weaken or destroy their cages enough to permit escape. Crack shots among zoo attendants are holding daily rifle practice in preparation for execution squad duties if the city is bombed.

Zoo Director Freeman M. Shelly has drawn a list of animals regarded as dangerous in event of escape and has assigned men to every vantage point in the zoo grounds with rifles. He has posted the list of dangerous animals where guards see them daily and memorize the locations and types to be destroyed.

Topping the list are the African buffaloes, quartered in the antelope house. The vicious horned beasts are to be killed on sight if they escape. The African elephant, "Josephine," and the hippopotamus, "Jimmy," are also on the death list.

USE OF WOOD GAINS IN WAR

Chicago (UP)—Lumber is coming into its own again, due to wartime priorities on several materials.

A recent survey at Chicago's merchandise mart revealed a great many articles now being made of wood, which formerly were produced of rubber and steel.

The little brass ferrule at the end of a pencil has given way to one made of wood. Wooden screws and pegs are being made to replace ones of brass and steel. Bicycle pedals are made of maple and hickory. Wood also is replacing some plastic materials needed in defense, being used for such articles as bottle stoppers, wheels, drawer pulls, handles and costume jewelry.

Continuation of the war will bring more wood products into the home in the shapes of salt cellars, platters, book ends, and lamps. Toys also will be made of wood to a large extent. New lines of wooden trains and buses have been produced. Wagons will sport wooden wheels.

Eat Right and Live Longer, Expert Says

Berkeley, Cal. (UP)—You can live to be 150 years old, if you eat right, according to Dr. Flora Rose, retired dean of the Cornell university home economics department.

The 150-year life span can all be enjoyed with vigorous health, too, she said, if the proper diet is followed.

"Nutrition is the key to a life in which one may enjoy the maturity of experience with youthful vigor," she declared.

Dr. Rose's dietary chart to longevity and good health includes consumption of a pint of milk daily, two vegetables, one green and the other yellow and raw; two fruits, one a citrus, and plenty of whole grain bread. Vitamin concentrates were recommended for persons who lead sedentary lives.
