

PLAN FOR POST WAR ACTIVITIES IN MINNESOTA

Money For Non-Essential Spending Is Earmarked For Use In Future.

St. Paul, Minn. (U.P.)—Minnesota is building a "post-war construction reserve," designed to cushion the shock of deflation after the war, which may serve as a pattern for similar programs in other states.

The program calls for accumulation of funds for construction of public works after the war and immediate curtailment of non-defense and non-essential spending.

The program was announced by Gov. Harold E. Stassen, who said it had been formulated by economists of the council of state governments. Stassen, president

of the council, said the plan "probably will be adopted in similar form" by other states.

Stassen said that inasmuch as Minnesota is one of the first states to adopt such a program, the plans would be sent to the council headquarters for use as a pattern.

The Minnesota plan calls for the setting aside immediately of \$4,000,000 in state highway funds and money earmarked previously for the state's building program. This will form the nucleus of the post-war reserve fund.

Plans now being made for highway and building construction will be filed away for use after the war. The program limits highway construction to the bare requirements of essential maintenance.

Stassen said he hoped part of the post-war fund could be invested in government bonds. He said, however, that the state attorney general would have to rule on the legality of the investment.

COUNCIL FORESEES MORE ACCIDENTS; CAUTION IS URGED

Chicago (U.P.)—National curtailment on the sale of new automobiles and tires may increase rather than decrease the number of traffic accidents, the National Safety Council believes.

Several points enumerated by Sidney J. Williams, national safety director of the council, appears to out-balance popular belief that the ban will solve traffic accident problems:

1. Motorists may find it difficult to keep their older cars in safe condition because of a shortage of spare parts and skilled mechanics.
2. Many cars unfit for service will go back on the roads.
3. Increased tempo of war production and transportation will aggravate further problems that already have sent the traffic toll to record proportions.

National Forest Timber for Sale

Sealed bids will be received by the Regional Forester, Portland, Oregon, up to and including April 13, 1942, for all the live timber marked or designated for cutting, and all merchantable dead timber located on an area embracing about 1,160 acres within Sections 20, 21, 28 and 29, T. 32 S., R. 3 E., W. M., Rogue River National Forest, Oregon, estimated to be 9,800,000 feet B.M., more or less, of Douglas-fir, and an unestimated amount of California incense-cedar, white fir and hemlock to be cut at the option of the purchaser. No bid of less than \$1.85 per M feet for Douglas-fir and \$1.00 per M feet for California incense-cedar, white fir and hemlock, will be considered. In determining the high bid, the rate for Douglas-fir only will be considered. In addition to the prices bid for the stumpage, a cooperative deposit of \$4.00 per M feet B.M. to be used by the Forest Service for paying the cost of slash disposal and a cooperative deposit of \$3.35 per M feet B.M. to cover the cost of tree planting, seed sowing and timber stand improvement work on the area cut over, for the total cut of timber under the terms of the agreement, will be required. \$3,000.00 must be deposited with each bid, to be applied on the purchase price, refunded, or retained in part as liquidated damages, according to conditions of sale. The right to reject any and all bids is reserved. Before bids are submitted, full information concerning the timber, the conditions of sale, and the submission of bids should be obtained from the Forest Supervisor, Medford, Oregon, or the Regional Forester, Portland, Oregon.
