There will be special music at each meeting, nightly through Sunday, March 29.

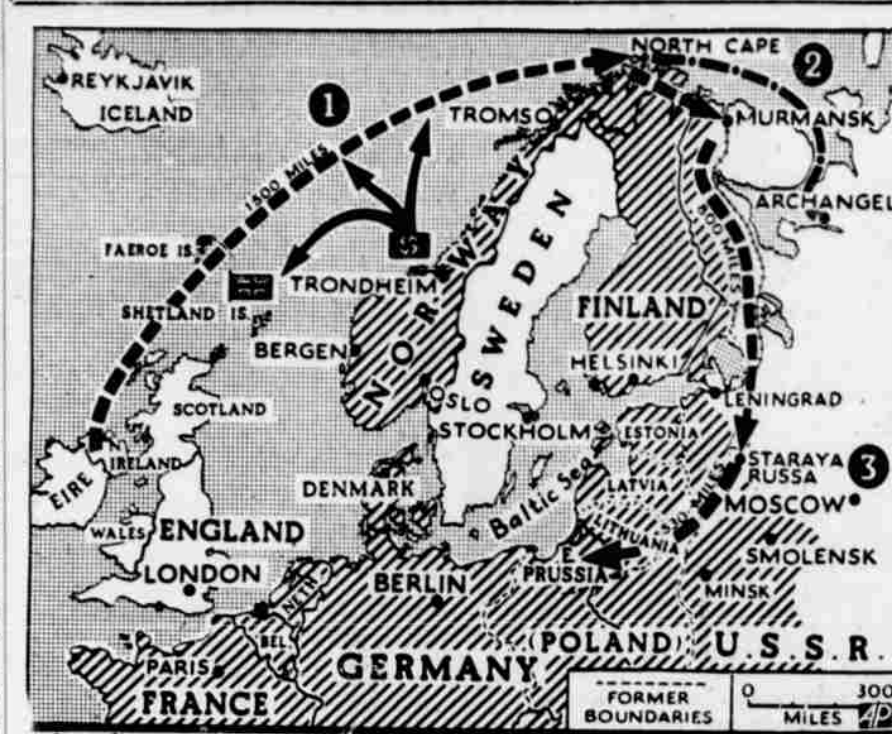
COWGILL DISCOURAGES GUERRILLA ENLISTMENTS
Portland, March 16.—(AP)—Col. Ralph P. Cowgill, commander of the Oregon state guard, advised members of the rapidly spreading guerrilla movement today to affiliate with organized troops.

Volunteer fighters without identifying insignia are liable to be shot by firing squads if captured by the enemy, he said. With identifying emblems, they are entitled to the privileges of prisoners of war.

War Front Moves To Top Of World



Major and naval operations underway indicate an offensive being taken against Germany and other lands dominated by her (diagonal shading) over a 1,500-mile pathway (1) into the North Cape-Murmansk area. The route is menaced from the Trondheim base where Germany has stationed naval units. Axis troops dominate Murmansk port and the supply route must go into Archangel (2). Success of the offensive coupled with Russian success at Staraya Russa (3) would cut out Finland, help Russia.

ARMY DESERTERS IN GUILTY PLEAS

Bristol, Va., March 16.—(AP)—Two young army deserters, Charles J. Lovett, 21, Philadelphia, and James Edward Testerman, 22, Clinchburg, Va., pleaded guilty to a charge of murder of an FBI agent at a hearing before U. S. Commissioner T. H. Crabtree here today.

The agent, Hubert J. Treacy, Jr., 28, of the Richmond office, was shot to death and Charles L. Tignor, 29, FBI agent at Bristol, was wounded four times in the chest when they attempted to arrest the soldiers in an Abingdon cafe Friday.

Crabtree ordered the pair, listed by the FBI as deserters from the third cavalry at Fort Oglethorpe, Ga., held for the U. S. district court grand jury session at Abingdon April 13.

Central Point P. O. Will Move Soon to 100F Hall Quarters

Transfer of Faber's feed store expected today in Central Point to a new building being constructed behind their grocery will prepare the way for moving the post office in that city to the Odd Fellows hall on the corner of Fourth and Pine streets.

The transfer will place the office one and a half blocks east of the old location, the Williams building. H. T. Pankey, postmaster, said need of fire protection and more room influenced the move. Influx of workers resulting from the cantonment and increased lumber production has brought a demand for an added number of post office boxes to supplement the two hundred already in use.

The office is to occupy the lower floor of the hall and actual moving awaits construction of the panel partition separating lobby and work room. Renovation is expected to take several weeks.

DUKE OF ATHOLL
London, March 16.—(AP)—John George Stewart-Murray, the Duke of Atholl, 70, veteran of campaigns in Egypt and South Africa and of the ill-starred Gallipoli expedition of the world war, died today. He

was present at the battles of Atbara and Khartoum while serving with the Nile expedition in 1898 and served in South Africa during the Boer war. He was commandant of the Scottish Horse during the first world war.
