HUNGER, EXPOSURE TAKES THOUSANDS IN BEATEN GREECE

Officials Estimate 150,000 to 200,000 Dead in Less Than Year of Occupation

Ca'ro, Egypt, March 16.—(AP)—Starvation, exposure and executions have taken a toll of 150,000 to 200,000 lives in Greece in less than a year of German-Italian occupation, Greek officials here estimate. Unless conditions improve, half of Greece's population of 7,000,000 may be dead before the war ends, these sources declared.

They said their estimates on the number of deaths were based on information obtained from persons escaping from the country and took into account only well-authenticated accounts.

The peak of suffering was said to have been reached in February, when an intense cold wave combined with lack of food and water to boost deaths in the Athens area alone to 1,500 daily.

"Only a strong man can survive," one refugee was quoted as saying. "There is much pneumonia and tuberculosis. There is little typhus yet, but it will come."

Some food—paid for in part by the Vanderbilt committee of the United States—has been shipped in, but this has been negligible in view of the nation's needs, it was stated.

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SOLDIERS ENJOY WINTER PEARS IN GREAT HOSPITAL

Pear Bureau Reports Fruit Going to Georgia—Camp Edwards Enjoys Pears.

Seattle—(Sp.)—More good news for winter pear growers from "way down in Georgia," where the largest army hospital in the world is located. Eighteen to twenty boxes of Anjou pears are being used every week for the officers, nurses and patients mess, according to Walker Pickens, Oregon-Washington-California Pear Bureau field representative, in his report to E. R. Pooley, president manager of the bureau.

Texas, too, sends good pear news. At Houston the Weingarten Stores have a new produce warehouse, the last word in construction, and according to R. S. Hazeltine, pear bureau representative, these people are very anxious to get into pear selling on a real scale, and are in a position to handle pear conditioning perfectly.

Philadelphia Too
And Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, reflects a good feeling regarding the pear deal, as practically all of the dealers handling winter pears have made a nice profit. Four cars of Bosc have been conditioned in that city this year and the dealers plan on putting the next car through the ripening room, reports O. W. Mann, representing the pear bureau there.

"Two hundred boxes of winter pears for two days were being listed at Camp Edwards for use in army meals, and we are making sure that the pears are conditioned before delivery," writes L. W. Veerkamp, Boston pear bureau representative.

R. A. Patterson, pear bureau representative in New York reports that Anjou conditioning in that city has a good start, with 3½ cars of Anjou on the barge for conditioning and another part car put on to thaw, a car of Bosc on the barge to thaw and a little better than half a car of Comice. He feels that the A and P stores will start conditioning pears there.
