LUMBER CONCERN WILL HAVE YARD IN CENTRAL POINT

Californians Constructing Mill Near Trail—Large Operation Is Prospected.

The Douglas Fir Lumber Co., recently formed by F. E. Fairfield, M. C. Wonderly and E. J. Ballyntine, of Long Beach, Cal., will have its distribution center in Central Point with opening of Ballyntine Lumber Sales when the company mill, 14 miles from Trail on the Tiller road, begins operation in approximately one month.

This information is released by M. P. Webb, manager of Ballyntine Sales, who is in Central Point superintending construction of the office building on the northeast corner of Manzanita street on the Pacific highway. Mr. Webb is also secretary of the Douglas Fir Lumber company.

According to Webb, F. E. Fairfield has purchased property with 120 foot frontage on the highway at the site of the office building. A portion of the Ballyntine lumber yard will be on the west side of the highway and a loading dock will be constructed along the railroad siding, Mr. Webb says. The yard there will have a 120 foot frontage opposite the motel.

The fir company is moving to its location above Trail, machinery bought from C. Mc. Johnson who remains in charge of the mill and log operations. Re-assembly will permit the sawing of 40 foot pieces and the mill will have a capacity of 40,000 feet in eight hours.

E. J. Ballyntine of Campbell—Ballyntine Lumber Company is indirectly associated with the California oil industry through sale of lumber supplies, and Fairfield and Wonderly are both identified with the oil industry in California.

Manager Webb, in the oil industry 23 years before coming to Oregon last week, has been employed by Fairfield for ten years. Porter J. Neff of Medford

is attorney for the two new firms.

A crane and truck belonging to the fir company were loaned to the city of Central Point last week to hoist the new air raid siren atop the tower on the city hall.

Broadcast by Nelson at 6:30 Tonight to Nip Axis Propaganda

Washington, March 17.—(AP)—War Production Chief Donald M. Nelson will make a "statement to the nation" tonight in a special broadcast designed to counteract axis propaganda which officials said described the production speed up drive as an attempt to "Sovietize" American industry.

WPB officials announced that the statement would climax a brief dramatization of the production drive over NBC, CBS and Mutual Broadcasting networks between 6:30 and 7 p. m. (Pacific war time), and that it "will cover a lot of ground."

The suddenly scheduled speech, it was understood, was arranged principally to block cleverly hand-picked "sniping" by axis propagandists here and abroad. In this country, it was reported, axis agents have actively supplemented Berlin and Tokyo radio broadcasts aimed against the management-labor committees established by Nelson as a nucleus for the speed-up in armament production.

Douglas to Speak At Grange Meet

Washington, March 17.—(AP)—Associate Justice William O. Douglas of the federal supreme court accepted an invitation yesterday to be principal speaker at the Oregon Grange convention this year.

Richard L. Neuberger, Grange member, said Douglas would speak either June 16 or 18, afterwards going to Wallawa county where he plans to build a summer home.

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Alcohol Grain Plan Making Progress Is WPB Director's Word

Washington, March 17.—(AP)—William L. Batt, materials director for the war production board, said today that the program for production of alcohol from grain in place of sugar or molasses was "going forward successfully."

At almost the same time Frasier H. Moffatt, chief of the W.L.B. alcohol section, said he foresaw the day when no sugar would be required for alcohol production.

Batt talked at a press conference and said that if the program for converting beverage distilleries to industrial alcohol production is completed this year a saving of molasses equal to 550,000 tons of sugar will result.

Moffatt told the house small business committee that about 700,000 tons of sugar would be needed for alcohol this year but the bulk of the expected production of 355,000,000 gallons of alcohol would come from grains and blackstrap molasses.

He said the new program would be under way by the end of the year.
