ESCAPED LIFER NABBED AFTER 22 YEARS FREE

Salem, March 18.—(AP)—Twenty-two years after his escape from the Oregon state penitentiary, where he was serving a life term for murder, Ralph Turpin, alias Robert Jordan, will be returned to serve the rest of his sentence. Prison Warden George Alexander announced today.

Turpin was convicted of the murder in Josephine county of William McAllister, and he entered prison Sept. 13, 1917. He soon was made a trusty at the prison farm, and escaped in 1920.

THE LOCAL PAPER PROBLEM
To the editor:

I read with interest the letter in last night's Mail-Tribune by Earle N. Leach asking about the local salvage program and waste paper in particular. Efficient salvage cannot be a hit or miss proposition. It must be organized by states, counties and cities. A salvage committee for the state of Oregon has just been appointed by the governor.

In the matter of waste paper salvage, more has been done locally than Mr. Leach probably realizes. Commencing on January 10 the Boy Scouts of Jackson and Siskiyou counties launched paper salvage campaigns in every community except Ashland. To date they have collected and shipped back to the reduction plants a total of 245,000 pounds of scrap paper of all kinds. They are still at it, making definite efforts to cover the entire community at regular intervals. A quarter million pounds of paper that must be collected, sorted, tied, hauled, stored and loaded into freight cars is a sizeable task for boys of any age.

It should also be understood that the nearest location for the disposal of this paper is Portland and freight rates on waste paper to Portland consume exactly half the value of the paper. All kinds of paper is being accepted by the Scouts, but it is true that magazines and newspapers are preferred because they take up much less room in a freight car for their weight. All leadership and adult help in this work as in all other phases of Boy Scout work is done by volunteer men and their time is not unlimited. The greatest help could be rendered by citizens who will volunteer their time and leadership to these community activities which are now aiding in national defense.

The Boy Scouts have started the local salvage campaign in waste paper and they have done a job. Incidentally one-third of one per cent of all waste paper collected by Scouts in America up to March first has been collected by Scouts in these two counties. We are willing to help in any kind of salvage effort when a local salvage committee is named to the job.

NICKEL SNATCHERS IN PRODUCTION BAN

Washington, March 18.—(AP)—Juke boxes, weighing machines, pinball games and other amusement machines today joined the growing list of articles banned from production due to the war.

The war production board gave the industry until May 1 to use up fabricated or partly fabricated materials on hand before being converted entirely to the war effort. But, it prohibited immediately the production of any repair parts for gaming machines and banned the cutting, stamping or processing of any copper, copper alloy, nickel or stainless steel for the machines to be banned.

The \$75,000,000 industry of about 30 companies, mostly in the Chicago area, employs about 10,000 persons and 11 of the companies already are producing parts for bomb sights, artillery shells, parts for airplane gun turrets and other war materials.

The British government rescinded the closing order of movie houses within a month after it had gone into effect as a means of strengthening civilian morale.

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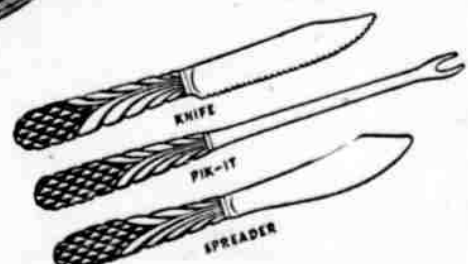


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
