

DINNER TABLE IN THICK OF BATTLE OVER INFLATION

OPA Authorities To Take New Offensive Action If Rise In Prices Continues.

Chicago, March 18.—(AP)—Dinner tables are the site of an economic war with a rapidly expanding front, a survey of price control measures on foods disclosed today.

The front ranges from canned tomato juice through an extended menu to canned peaches, and the housewife who shies from fresh vegetables can have a complete price-control meal, with meat included.

Office of price administration authorities, leading the campaign against inflation at meal time, are believed ready to assume the offensive against additional salient in the near future, if it should be necessary.

Pork Ceiling Monday

Major action so far will become effective Monday, when wholesale price ceilings will be clamped upon about 90 per cent of all pork products. Such well known items as bacon, ham and pork chops will not be permitted to rise above highest levels prevailing between March 3 and 7.

most popular meat of a meat-eating nation. Pork forms about 50 percent of America's annual meat diet. The remaining 50 percent is divided between beef, lamb and veal, with beef the most popular.

Previously the OPA had moved to check rising price tendencies on 11 canned fruits and 15 canned vegetables. Price ceilings, applying only to canners and wholesalers, were placed in effect March 2.

Victory Complete

Victims in this earlier skirmish included canned beans, beets, carrots, peas, spinach, apricots, cherries and apples. In fact, there were few, if any, canned fruit and vegetables which escaped. The OPA's victory was complete.

Liquid as well as solid foods comprise the battle ground. Wholesale limits have been placed on coffee, tea and cocoa. Milk is controlled by federal marketing agreements in various dairy sheds. There are also price ceilings on fats and oils.

BURCH AND REAMES AT MINING MEETING

Portland, Ore., March 18.—(Sp)—Among the mining and technical engineers, power experts, and recognized authorities in related fields who met at Reed college this week to determine ways of expanding the production of strategic minerals in the northwest were Albert Burch, of Black Oak ranch, and A. E. Reames, attorney, both of Medford.

Oscar L. Chapman, assistant secretary of the department of interior, conducted the meeting. With him were a corps of representatives from the Federal Bureau of Mines and the United States Geological Survey.

23,000 JAPANESE IN CANADA HEGIRA

Vancouver, B. C., March 17.—(CP)—A vast and unparalleled evacuation of 23,000 men, women and children of Japanese origin from important coastal areas is being carried out by the Canadian government as part of a Pacific coast defense plan.

Coastal steamers cruising through mountainous channels of the British Columbia coast have collected the first of the Japanese for transfer to points east of the Cascade mountains where they will remain for the duration of the war.

The project has been carefully worked out and divided into three phases, the first of which will end with the removal of 2,500 persons from the west coast of Vancouver island and the mainland coast north of Vancouver.

The second phase calls for evacuation of the Japanese from the east coast of Vancouver island and from the gulf islands that lie between that land barrier and the mainland. The third will be concerned with those in Vancouver and the adjacent mainland district where most of them are located.
