LIONS CLUB TOLD POST-WAR PLANS TO CUSHION DROP

W. M. (Jack) Bartlett of Portland, state director of the Public Work Reserve, a federal works agency, described to Wednesday noon's Lion club luncheon-meeting in the Hotel Medford the plan of the reserve to launch a public improvement program following the war to assist in cushioning the deflationary conditions expected.

Mr. Bartlett said that tentative plans of the reserve, designed to prevent a recurrence of the acute misfortune of economy of the last depression, included a program of reforestation, road and bridge building and power manufacturing.

The state body, he explained, will cooperate with county and city subdivisions to analyze the betterment needs, plan in detail for permanent improvements and avoid mistakes.

In Oregon, he said, improvement is possible in agriculture and education. The state contributes less money for education than any other in the country, he stated, and pointed out that six out of every 10 high school students received no religious instruction and the grade school students even less.

Paul R. Washke spoke briefly on his mission to Medford in behalf of civilian defense.

MUTUAL AID AIM IN COLLEGE PACT—Philadelphia (U.P.)—Is this Haverford College? This is Swarthmore College. May we borrow a botany paper for a day or two?

This request, unusual as it may seem, is not impossible under the cooperative system established by Haverford, Swarthmore and Bryn Mawr colleges, with complete coordination of the facilities of the three institutions now an established fact—including the exchange of professors.

The coordinating system was set up in the interest of economy and a broadening of the curriculum at each of the three schools. It is also expected to alleviate the problem of teacher replacements created by government calls for research experts.

Haverford is headed by Dr. Felix Morley, Swarthmore by John W. Nason, and Bryn Mawr, a girls' school, by Marion Edwards Park. The three educators established the cooperative system after conferences in which the individual problems of the schools were found to be almost identical.

WAINWRIGHT TO BE LT. GENERAL

Washington, March 19—(P)—Major General Jonathan M. Wainwright, who succeeded General Douglas MacArthur as commander of the beleaguered American and Filipino forces on the Bataan peninsula, was nominated by President Roosevelt today to be a lieutenant general.

Wainwright had been serving as second in command to MacArthur and then took full charge of the defense of the peninsula and forts at the mouth of Manila bay when MacArthur was ordered to Australia to become supreme commander of united nations forces in the southwest Pacific. He is a native of Walla Walla.

CONVICT PROSPERS THROUGH HIS PEN

Lansing, Mich. (U.P.)—Ronald Finney, 42-year-old, convict at Kansas penitentiary, is an extraordinary prisoner. He has achieved comparative prosperity by writing stories and articles and selling them to trade publications.

30 YEARS NEEDED TO BUILD CHURCH

Today the spires of St. Bernard Church tower 142 feet into the air and when the finishing touches are completed there will be room for 1,000 people to worship in a monument to the simple faith of a simple people.

The people of this community both paid for and built the church through their own efforts. They raised money by means of annual four-day picnics. When they had sufficient money, work on the building progressed, each member of the community contributing his share.

Stone for the huge Gothic edifice was quarried at Shelburne, N. S., and shipped in fishermen's schooners whenever the boats were available.

A dedication service will officially open the church this summer.
