Mr. and Mrs. Vern L. Drager of 112 South Holly street are in receipt of an interesting letter from their son, Jack, second class seaman on a U. S. destroyer based at Pearl Harbor. Jack writes, in part:

"Hawaii—land of sunshine and flowers—phooey! Never did see more cold and rain and wind. Just take Portland and add a wind of about 40 miles an hour and you've got Hawaii now. Most of the water is spray, instead of rain. The salt cakes on your skin and it feels like it shrunk. I can't see how salt can be so salty.

"If you can hang onto something and watch, the rest of the crew sure look funny. This morning I came off watch and they were eating. The deck was all wet and the water was running off the awnings. The ship would roll and the looks they would get on their faces and the positions they would get into to keep from sliding—they couldn't hold onto anything because they had a plate full of chow in one hand and a cup of coffee in the other, and usually and orange tucked under one arm. The ship would keep rolling back and forth and each time it passed the center they could take a couple of steps.

"Every once in awhile someone would slip and usually hit at least one other guy on his way across the deck. Boy, such antics. You would be surprised how much rolling around you can do with a plate full and not spill it. As soon as I got some chow I was just like everybody else and too busy to watch the rest of them.

"Here at the islands it is all defensive war and it is OK, but I don't feel like I am getting anything done. So as soon as I can I am going to try and get into aviation. I want to go and attack the Japs. would like to get this over with and come home."
