

TRANSPORT LACK DUE TO BE ACUTE, EASTMAN STATES

Washington (AP)—Shortage of transportation facilities in many cities is expected to become more acute as the war effort gains momentum.

Despite increased loads, the war production board is unlikely to release strategic materials for new equipment. Defense Transportation Director Joseph B. Eastman warned in suggesting steps that might help relieve congestion.

Methods of making greatest possible use of facilities, Eastman pointed out, are staggering business, school and working hours, improving regulation of street traffic to speed vehicle movement, and making more efficient use of private automobiles through doubling up.

Staggering of hours, a step already taken in government agencies, promises to be one of the most effective methods of relieving the problem, he said.

He stressed the importance of this program by pointing out that in most cities more than 50 per cent of total volume of local traffic is carried during morning and evening rush hours, leaving 50 to 75 per cent of the facilities idle during the rest of the day.

LIFE IN PRISON FOR WIFE SLAYER

Port Angeles, Wash., March 20.—(AP)—Superior Judge H. G. Sutton today sentenced Monty Illingworth, former Long Beach, Calif., truck driver, to "not more than your natural life" for the second degree murder of his wife, Halie, a Port Angeles waitress. He rejected Illingworth's motion for a new trial.

Illingworth was returned here last fall after the body of a woman recovered from Lake Crescent had been identified, by a dental plate, as that of his wife, missing since 1937.

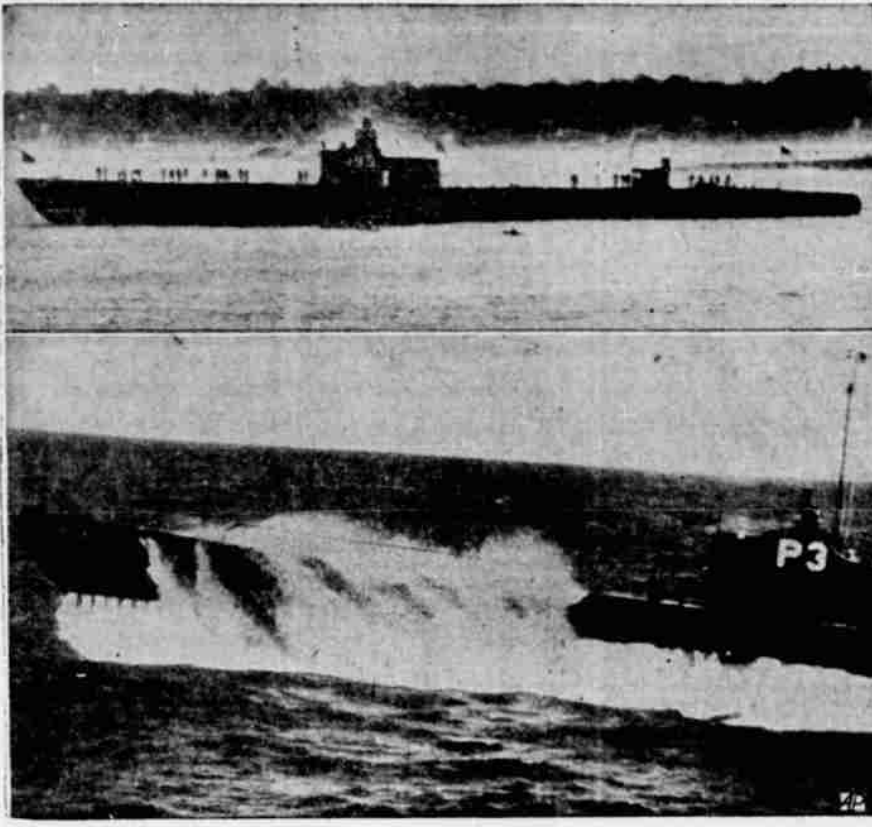
YANKS WITH CANADIANS MAY TRANSFER TO U. S.

Ottawa, March 20.—(AP)—United States citizens serving with Canadian forces may apply for transfer to the armed forces of their own country under an agreement announced today by Prime Minister W. L. Mackenzie King.

The prime minister told the house of commons notes had been exchanged between the United States and Canada affecting the 15,000 to 16,000 Americans now with the Canadian army, naval and Royal Canadian Air Force.
