FEED WHEAT CAR AWAITING ORDERS

Livestock and poultry producers desiring feed wheat at 332 per ton should place orders with the AAA office immediately, County Agent R. G. Fowler emphasized today. The county agent said the service may be dropped unless there are enough orders to make carload lots and he also revealed that the price would raise April 1.

The commodity credit corporation is selling the wheat for feed purposes to increase production and relieve pressure on grain elevators.

Fowler said five cars have been delivered and unless more orders are received the sixth car cannot be shipped. Buyers furnish sacks and pay cash with their orders.

JAPS UNWANTED IN VALE REGION

Salem, March 20.—(P)—John L. Caldwell, Jr., secretary of the Vale Chamber of Commerce, telegraphed Governor Charles A. Sprague yesterday that migration of Japanese to the Vale district would be opposed unless they are concentrated in groups and placed under military supervision.

He said citizens in that region do not want Japanese unless they are colonized, supervised, prohibited from buying or leasing land, and that they be removed after the war.

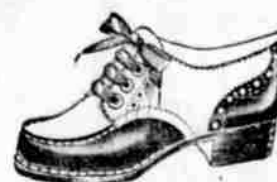

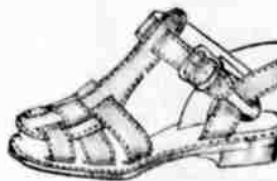
