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High School Music Department Presents Program

The Medford Senior high school music department was presented Friday evening by Miss Miriam Burton, music supervisor in an interesting program of band and vocal selections. The art department at the high school joined in the program by a series of colored chalk backgrounds which formed a setting for "live pictures" descriptive of the vocal numbers presented by the girls' and boys' choruses.

The first group of numbers, following the string ensemble playing "Fugue in G Major" by Bach, portrayed the "Lady of Shalott" by Tennyson-Bendall. This cantata was based on the well-known lyric poem by the same name and the students, seated in the balcony, chorused the story of the Lady of Shalott. The stage was set four times with colored pictures, depicting scenes from the famed poem with students taking part in the live pictures.

The boys' chorus sang "Dirge of Two Veterans" by Whitman-Holst and lighting on the picture cast a blue shadow on the crosses of the father and son who had died together.

Following intermission the band under the direction of Wilson Wait presented "Black Horse Troop" by Sousa; "Pax et Labor" by Paris; "Elsa Entering the Cathedral" from "Lohengrin" by Wagner, "White Cliffs of Dover" by Kent-Burton and "Great Day" by Youmans.

The mixed chorus led by Miss Helene Leach sang "Choral Fantasy From Faust" by Gounod-Vincent. This work is said to have reached the heights of dramatic musical beauty not found in other works of Gounod. The composition of 19th century French school is universally known.

The band and chorus presented as their closing number the theme from "Pomp and Circumstance" by Elgar and the program closed with the audience joining in "Star Spangled Banner."

Two Speakers Appear on Study Club Program

Mrs. Frank Alberts and Mrs. J. W. Jacobs were speakers at the meeting of the Wednesday Study club at the Girls' Community clubhouse during the last week. "Chile" was the topic of Mrs. Alberts' talk and Mrs. Jacobs reviewed the book, "Broad and Alien Is the World," by Ciro Anegrio, Peruvian writer. The book is a translation of a prize-winning Peruvian writing.

In her talk Mrs. Alberts described Chile geographically as a country of three parts, the subarctic desert of the north where copper and nitrate are found; the central valley which is industrial in nature and the southern regions where rains fall on a wilderness of fjords, virgin forests, rough pasture lands and icy glaciers.

Mrs. Alberts pointed out that until 1810 Chile was a neglected outpost of the crown and her population was divided between a small company of land holders and a great body of laborers. One estate in Varpariso had 4,000 workers and did not use a single piece of machinery as labor is cheap and machinery expensive. Ox teams are seen everywhere in Chile pulling two-wheeled carts or plows. Population in Chile is divided and there are 85,000 Germans in the country. In Valdivia, 161 telephones were listed and 129 of these were under German names.

The war of 1879 gave Chile undisputed possession of the nitrate area and brought 40 years of prosperity to the southern country. In 1910 Chile furnished 64.3 per cent of the world's nitrate but in 1935 only 7.1 per cent. Less nitrate has increased the output of the chief by-product which is iodine.
