

M'ALLISTER WILL SEEK REELECTION TO LEGISLATURE

Medford Attorney To Seek Speakership If Retained; Gives Up Congress Idea.

William M. McAllister, Medford attorney, announced yesterday he would seek reelection for his fourth term as one of Jackson county's two representatives in the state legislature.

Mr. McAllister, a Republican, said he would file his intention with the secretary of state in a few days.

If elected, Mr. McAllister said he planned to become a candidate for speaker of the house in the 1941 session he lost the speakership to Robert S. Farrell, Jr., of Multnomah county by only a few votes.

Commenting on reports that he might become a candidate for U. S. congressman from the new fourth district, Mr. McAllister said he had given it some consideration but had decided to again run for the state legislature "in view of the capable candidates already in the congressional field and the urging of friends and associates in the state legislature to try for reelection and become a candidate for speaker."

Mr. McAllister has served three sessions at Salem, in 1937, 1939 and 1941. In the session of 1939 he was chairman of the committee on judiciary, and in the 1941 session was chairman of the committee on revision of laws.

If reelected, Mr. McAllister said he would "continue efficient representation to the best of my ability."
