COUNTY CAMPAIGN FOR CHINA RELIEF GETS UNDER WAY

Meeting Sunday at Court-house Plans Drive—Local Leaders of Effort Named.

The Jackson county campaign for the United China Relief opened yesterday when representatives from various service clubs, churches and other organizations met at the county courthouse auditorium to lay plans for the week's campaign. Rev. R. W. Coleman and Mrs. Margaret Fabrick are co-chairmen for the county with C. E. "Pop" Gates acting as city chairman.

The drive is a community campaign and is sponsored in Jackson county by the Medford Ministerial association. House-to-house solicitation is planned this week and deposits also may be made at the two banks and the Chamber of Commerce. Treasurers for the drive are E. B. Humphrey, U. S. National bank, and C. L. Newland, of the First National bank.

The state United China Relief drive is headed by Jesse J. Gard, vice president of the U. S. National bank in Portland, with R. M. Loughrey, of the General Electric company, also of Portland, as regional director. Dr. Erma Gordon, state representative for the drive, is in Medford for several days in the interest of the drive.

Governor Charles A. Sprague, in a recent statement on the United China Relief drive, said: "The first victims of ruthless aggression in the post-world war period were the people of China. They continue subject to invasion, pillaging and oppression, yet with distinguished courage and endurance they continue their resistance. China is entitled to the sympathy and the material aid of the people of the United States. Our consistent policy has been to uphold the integrity of China. We feel that policy is important in our own interest and contributes to world peace and stability. Support to China is the surest way to enable China survive."

The United China Relief campaign now getting under way in this state affords an opportunity for the American people to help minister to human need and to show our sincere sympathy with the cause of China. Our gifts will not only bring relief to the hungry, the injured, the dispossessed, it will bring them new faith to fight on to final victory.

"I heartily endorse this campaign in Oregon and make a personal appeal to the generosity of the people of this state. Let us give out of purse and heart for the relief of our afflicted neighbors across the Pacific."

Melbourne, March 23.—(P)—Gen. Douglas MacArthur bosses the allied armies in this part of the world, but in his own household the supreme command rests with his dark-eyed little wife.

This was demonstrated today when Mrs. MacArthur took their small son Arthur on a shopping tour.

She promptly deposited young Arthur in a barber shop chair and ordered a good haircut for him.

"The general said Arthur was not to have a haircut because

he might catch cold," the smiling mother told the barber.

"But look at him—he needs a haircut badly. His father is not around now to stop it, so let's trim it up."

Reporters attending the general's press conference earlier noted that MacArthur himself needed a haircut, but concluded that he was much too busy to have it done.

Comice Gift Boxes Topic of Story in Farmers' Periodical

Rogue River valley pears received mention in the April issue of the "Farm Journal and Farmer's Wife," published in Philadelphia. In an article on farm marketing is included a photo of a gift box of Du Comice pears and a short description of the gift method of marketing. The article says in part:

"The idea was tried out in a small way by a fruit packing concern at Medford four years ago, and it spread to several others. Shipments increased so surprisingly that close to a half million gift boxes were expressed out last year. Think of it!—a half million neat little packages, each containing from 12 to 14 huge Comice pears nicely wrapped with holiday trimmings and with the donor's card inclosed. All the Comice

pears grown in the district now go to market this way.

"These pears are distinctive in flavor, for Comice is very fussy about where it will consent to grow commercially, is seldom found for sale in the general market, is practically unknown to thousands who have never seen or tasted one."

"Who orders the gift boxes? All sorts of folks. And it's a cash business, the most of which comes by mail to the packing houses. Orders run all way from one to 1,800 boxes, the latter figure representing an order from a big corporation that wanted to remember each one of its many customers at Christmas."
