

W. A. GATES MADE COUNTY CHAIRMAN DEFENSE SAVINGS

Well Known Businessman Succeeds Earl Newbry—Aggressive Effort Planned

William A. Gates, Medford, has been appointed chairman of the Jackson county defense savings staff, according to an announcement today by Glenn

Jackson, regional director of the war financing effort. The appointment was made by Palmer Hoyt, state chairman, and notification was sent to Mr. Gates by Ray Conway, state administrator of the Oregon defense savings staff at Portland.

Gates will succeed Earl Newbry as chairman for this county. Mr. Newbry, who has served since August, 1941, recently resigned to devote his time to his campaign for the office of state senator from Jackson county.

Deputy State Administrator George Godfrey was in Medford last week conferring with Regional Chairman Jackson and other defense savings officials in this area. State officials, in announcing the new appointment, expressed gratification in the fact that Mr. Gates would bring to the defense savings effort in this area aggressive and effective leadership. Regret was also expressed at the loss of Mr. Newbry as chairman although it was understood that he would be retained on the Jackson county staff. Appreciation was also voiced for Newbry's contribution to the war financing program in Jackson county during the past several months.

Mr. Gates is owner and operator of two large Groceria super food markets, past-president of the state grocers' association and a director of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce. Committees have not yet been made public by Mr. Gates but assurance was given that the organization would have county-wide representation and grange and 4-H clubs would be recognized in planning an aggressive campaign.
