ASHLAND SEEKING FSA RECREATIONAL BUILDING MONEY

City Expects Thousands of Camp White Soldiers—Extensive Plans Drawn.

Ashland, March 24.—(Sp.)—Representatives of various Ashland organizations and committees today voted unanimously to make application to the Federal Security Agency for funds for construction of a standard recreational building in Ashland, where recreational programs for the soldiers would be centered.

It is contemplated that thousands of soldiers will visit Ashland when Camp White is functioning, probably the middle of the summer. This will require extensive entertainment and recreational facilities and programs.

Mrs. A. S. V. Carpenter, chairman of the Jackson County recreational committee, and E. W. Carlton, member of the county executive committee, as well as Frank J. Van Dyke, Jackson County Coordinating Board manager, were present. Mrs. Earl Leever, Ashland recreational committee chairman, presided.

It was definitely established that no formal application for a federally-constructed and financed recreational building had been made for Ashland, although considerable discussion had been held in relation to such a building.

New Building Needed
It has been previously suggested that one of several buildings in the city might be used for this recreational center, but it was the consensus at the meeting that probably none of these would be adequate.

Mrs. Leever explained the extensive entertainment programs and committees which her committee is arranging and various phases of the subject were discussed.

Councilman Ralph Kooser moved that a formal application be made by the city to the Federal Security Agency that a recreational building be constructed here and that Ashland Coordinating Committee of which G. M. Green, Dean Peiper and Mrs. Leever were present, make a complete survey and brief of the recreational needs and facilities here to be presented in the application. The motion carried unanimously.

Rogue River Seniors To Make Annual Trip To Salem, Portland

Rogue River, March 24.—(Sp.)—Seniors of Rogue River high school, accompanied by Ethel Krauss and Gladys Shelley, will leave Thursday morning on the annual four-day educational tour. With Lloyd Smith driving the school bus the party will reach Salem in the evening where they will be met by Walter V. Dennis, superintendent of the school, who is attending the annual superintendents' conference there. En route the party will visit University of Oregon, Eugene vocational school, and Oregon State college.

On Friday and Saturday the class will visit manufacturing plants, Oregon State library, Willamette university, the capitol, state forestry building, penitentiary, Fairview Home, state hospital, Hillcrest School of Oregon, Oregon state school for the blind, and Oregon state training school. In Portland the tour will include a trip to manufacturing plants, department stores, airport, and other points of interest. The return trip will be made Sunday.

Expenses of the tour are paid by class funds derived from various activities during the year. The annual tour began five years ago with only four seniors making the trip. It was more of a recreational trip than an educational tour.
