

'POP' GATES ASKS QUICK ACTION ON CHINESE RELIEF

Chairman of Campaign in
City Issues Statement
On Need of Contributions.

The United China Relief drive is underway throughout the county and contributions are being received by the solicitors. The drive in Jackson county to raise money for needy purposes in China lasts this week and those not contacted may leave their donations at either Medford bank or at the Chamber of Commerce.

C. E. "Pop" Gates heads the city campaign with Mrs. Margaret Fabrick as chairman of the vicinity outside Medford. Concerning the drive Mr. Gates said:

"At the request of the members of the Medford committee on the drive for the China Relief, I have accepted the chairmanship for the city of Medford on this drive. Our quota in the city of Medford is very small considering the worthiness of this cause.

"Millions of children are starving in China for the want of food, nourishment, medical supplies, etc., and I wish to appeal to the citizens of Medford to help and to do so as quickly as possible. Any amount is acceptable no difference how small.

It was gratifying to have three different parties voluntarily turn in subscriptions to me this morning—Lewis Super Service Station, Mr. and Mrs. Joe E. Earley of Hotel Holland, and Mrs. Margaret Fabrick—their subscriptions totaled \$50.

"One very popular subscription is the donation of enough to keep a child for one year, which entitles the giver to a beautiful certificate showing them to be the 'esteemed grandparent' of one child in China. This is fostered by Madame Chiang Kai-shek.

Honorary president of this organization is Mrs. Benjamin Harrison, wife of the former United States President Benjamin Harrison, who to my surprise, as I am an ex-Hoosier, is still living and nearing the century mark.

"Any who would like to receive one of these certificates at the low price of \$20 I would be very pleased to have call at the Chamber of Commerce. I will have you enrolled and have the certificate sent to you. It would be very worthy and very much appreciated by the people of China to have many Americans enrolled as 'esteemed grandparents' to the suffering children of China.

"If there is any information or anything you would like to know about this cause I would appreciate your calling at the Chamber of Commerce any day this week. Medford has never fallen down on any occasion of this kind and I know they will not this time. If there is any one who would like to volunteer to solicit some small district, I will appreciate your help."

DOCTORS, DENTISTS IN HEAVY DEMAND

New York, March 24.—(AP)—All doctors, dentists and veterinarians in the United States will receive questionnaires next week to determine how they can best serve in the nation's war effort.

Announcement of the projected mailing of questionnaires was made last night by Major Samuel F. Seeley, director of the procurement and assignment service of the office of defense health and welfare.

Seeley, speaking before the New York county medical society, said that the army alone needed 16,000 physicians by Dec. 1, and that the navy would need another 3,000 by the time its planned enlistment of 500,000 men was completed.

DRASTIC CUT URGED IN RECLAMATION SPENDING

Washington, March 24.—(AP)—The appropriations committee recommended to the house today that funds for the reclamation bureau be drastically cut for the next fiscal year starting July 1 to a total of \$78,899,360.

The amount was \$22,462,240 less than appropriations for the current year and \$13,702,290 less than the amount recommended by the budget. Of the total recommended by the committee, \$77,268,198 was for the general fund reclamation projects and special accounts and the remainder for the reclamation fund.

The petitioners are Matilda Kruger, of Washington, D. C., and Rose Zinn, of Dubois, Pa., named with five other nephews

and nieces as modest beneficiaries. The balance of the estate, worth in the neighborhood of \$18,000, is bequeathed to Mrs. May Hunter of Antelope, Mont. The petitioners allege undue influence was exercised upon Caroline Epler who died June 14, 1940, further claiming she was not competent to make the will due to age and illness. The will was filed for probate October 8, 1940.

The executor in his answer denies all allegations.
