RESTRICTIONS ON MEN'S CLOTHING START MARCH 30

John P. Moffat, manager of Mann's department store, was in receipt today of a special bulletin from the National Retail Dry Goods association setting forth restrictions imposed by the war production board on the cutting of men's and boys' clothing.

The order, M-73-A, designed to conserve wool, becomes effective March 30 for clothing manufacturers and May 30 for tailors to the trade, according to the bulletin.

Length of coats and fullness of garments are restricted. No more trousers with cuffs will be permitted. Double-breasted suits must be made without vests. Patch pockets are prohibited. Full dress coats are out, as are cutaway coats. Double-breasted tuxedos are forbidden. The two-piece suit is eliminated. With a single-breasted suit a vest may not have patch pockets, collars or lapels. Basic coat length is set at 29½ inches for a size 37 regular, with other sizes and variations in normal proportions.

The order also forbids fancy back suit and sport coats, restricts maximum width of trousers at the knee to 22 inches and at the bottom to 18½ inches for a 32 waist regular with variations in normal proportions permitted for other sizes, forbids pleated, tucked or continuous waist band trousers and prohibits trouser belts of wool cloth, although normal separate belts are not affected.

Restrictions on topcoats and overcoats include limiting of men's single-breasted coats to a length of 43½ inches and a width of 56 inches at the bottom for a size 37, regular, with variations in normal proportion for other sizes; the limiting of boys' size 14 coats to 37½ inches in length and 48 inches in width at the bottom, and for double-breasted topcoats or overcoats the length of men's size 37 regular is limited to 44½ inches and the width at the bottom to 62 inches, and of boy's size 14 to a length of 37½ inches and a bottom width of 53 inches, with variations for other sizes.

The order also provides there shall be no inside or outside patch pockets of wool cloth, no cuffs on sleeves, no belts, pleats or any type of fancy backs and

no lining cloth containing new wool on topcoats or overcoats. The bulletin explained that the order in no way affects the men's and boys' clothing already on hand in the stores and that sale of such may continue without regard to the order or the date, except that trousers must not be finished with cuffs.

Miss Burke, Sister of Mrs. Don Clark, Passes in Tucson

Word was received in Medford today of the sudden death of Miss Louise Burke, 63 years old, in Tucson, Arizona, last night, following a severe heart attack. Miss Burke, sister of Mrs. Donald Clark of this city, lived on the Burke ranch north of Medford for several years, and has many friends in the valley who will be shocked to hear of her sudden passing.

Miss Burke left Medford to enter Y.W.C.A. work when this country entered the first world war, and never returned to Medford to reside, making her home with her sister, Mrs. Valentine Pulsifer of New York City and Cornwall-on-Hudson. For several years she had spent her winters in Tucson where she found relief from severe sinus trouble.

Interment will be in the Burke family plot, Graceland Cemetery, Chicago, Illinois.
