LINDY ACCEPTS
FORD JOB OFFER

Detroit, March 26.—(P)—Officials of the Ford Motor company said today that Charles A. Lindbergh has accepted Henry Ford's offer of a position in the engineering research department of the company's Willow Run bomber plant.

Lindbergh, they said, advised them from Washington that the war department had approved his acceptance of the post. Lindbergh went to Washington after visiting with Ford and other executives of the company at Dearborn and Willow Run on Tuesday.

It was not disclosed when Lindbergh would take up his duties at the bomber plant, now nearing completion.

Wheat Insurance to
Set Oregon Record

Corvallis, March 26.—(P)—Oregon farmers will have more wheat crop insurance in force this year than ever before. Clyde Kiddie, federal crop insurance assistant with the state AAA office, said today. Wheat production on 6123 farms is covered under 3802 applications received in advance of the deadline. This is an increase of 1432 farms over last year. Approximately six million bushels of normal yield is involved.

Highest Decoration
For Gen. MacArthur

Washington, March 26.—(P)—A congressional medal of honor the nation's highest decoration for valor under fire, is going to General MacArthur today by order of President Roosevelt.

The medal, a spread eagle and five-pointed star swung from a blue silk ribbon, will be presented to the commander-in-chief of the southwest Pacific by Nelson T. Johnson, United States minister to Australia.

AXIS WOOS INDIA
TO STIR UNREST

London, March 26.—(P)—Apparently seeking to counter Sir Stafford Cripps' mission to India, the axis announced today that it was launching its own Indian independence movement.

The Berlin radio broadcast a Tokyo dispatch asserting that representatives of the "Indian independence party" from Hongkong, Malaya, Thailand and Shanghai would convene March 28 in Tokyo for a two-day conference.

"Definite measures will be undertaken in aid of the Indian independence movement," the broadcast said.

The axis propaganda machine has been using its radio facilities to the utmost to encourage Indian unrest during Sir Stafford's effort to win Indian support by British pledges of greater freedom.
