

Crop, Feed Loans Offered Farmers To Aid Production

"To the maximum extent which the authorizing act of congress will allow, the Emergency Crop and Feed Loan section of the Farm Credit Administration is making an 'all out' effort to assist in the 'food for victory' program by lending to farmers whose financial requirements are not large but who are unable otherwise to obtain reasonably adequate credit," according to V. N. Freeman, field supervisor of the Emergency Crop and Feed Loan Office.

Loans are made for the production of all cash crops, including vegetables and fruit. Loans are also made for the purchase or production of feed for livestock. No loan made to any borrower shall exceed \$400 nor shall a loan be so made in the calendar year which, together with the unpaid principal of prior loans made that year, shall exceed \$400 in amount. Rate of interest is 4 per cent a year.

Sub Cut in Two by Darkened Freightler

New Orleans, March 27.—(AP)—The New Orleans States said today that a ship had arrived here to undergo repairs for a damaged bow received some time ago when it rammed and sank a submarine in the Caribbean while voyaging to New Orleans with light cargo and without lights.

The submarine, crashed while running on the surface, was reportedly cut in two, the ship's lookout asserting he saw two men thrown clear and swimming in the water.

Fear of other subs in the vicinity and speed of the vessel prevented any attempt to rescue survivors, the States said.

Spring Pot Roast of Fancy Thorndike
Steer Beef

- 3- to 4-pound blade pot roast
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
- 1/4 cup water
- 8 stalks celery
- 6 carrots, halved
- 5 potatoes, halved
- 1 teaspoon salt
- Paprika

Have meat cut 2 to 2 1/2 inches thick. Season with 1 teaspoon salt and brown on both sides in hot fat in Dutch oven. Add Worcestershire sauce and water. Cover and cook slowly until tender, 1 to 2 hours. Place potatoes at center of meat, arrange other vegetables diagonally from center, spoke-fashion. Baste with stock; add remaining salt; sprinkle with paprika. Cover and cook 35 minutes or until vegetables are tender. Drain stock and make gravy pour over meat and vegetables. Serve in Dutch oven.

- 2 lbs. Ground Ham and Veal
- 1 teaspoon minced onion
- 1 beaten egg
- 1/4 cup milk
- 1 cup cracker crumbs
- 1 can tomato sauce
- 1 teaspoon dry mustard
- 1/4 cup hot water

Combine meats, onion, egg, milk, and crumbs. Pack in greased 8-inch square pan. Bake in moderate oven (350 deg.) 30 minutes. Pour off excess fat. Baste with combined remaining ingredients. Continue baking 45 minutes. Serves 8 to 9.
