

TRAINING SCHOOL HEAD SPEAKS TO HEALTH WORKERS

Supt. Wooley Says Juvenile
Crime Increase Is Due
With End of Hostilities.

The public of Oregon was warned to be on the lookout for a juvenile crime wave as result of the war, when M. D. Wooley, new superintendent of the Oregon state boys' training school, addressed the Jackson County Public Health association and guests at the court house auditorium Thursday afternoon. While was generally bringing a decrease in adult crime, Mr. Wooley pointed out, they bring an increase of juvenile offenders. This has already happened in England. It happened in the United States soon after World War I broke out and it will happen again if preventive measures are not taken, he said.

The increased flow of money, he explained, seems to lessen adult crime, but a gang spirit grows up, which leads juveniles into the wrong paths. It is a reaction to the emotional upheaval, he pointed out. Indictable crimes among juveniles increased 75 percent in England after the outbreak of the war, he stated.

Learn By Doing
Boys are now learning by doing in the Oregon training school, Mr. Wooley told his audience, explaining that the old reform school idea is fast disappearing in all parts of the nation. The old idea of reform by coercion is out except in dictator nations, for it has been found that as soon as the hand of tyranny is removed the subjects resort to their old or more unfavorable ways. Nations as well as men will find, Mr. Wooley declared, that it doesn't

work. There is no permanency in reform by coercion.

A film, illustrating the rehabilitation program now under way at the training school was then shown the audience by Mr. Wooley.

Preventive Work Told

The preventive work, which is being done in the state in an effort to keep children from needing the training school program was described to the audience by Allen East, secretary of the Oregon child guidance clinic. He used as basis for his address a book, written by Leslie B. Hohman, M.D., of Johns Hopkins university. "As the Twig Is Bent" is the title of the book and Mr. East used as subject of his address the particular topic, "The Child Will Grow Out Of It—Is This Wishful Thinking?"

Answering the question himself, Mr. East declared "for practical purposes it is wishful thinking."

Mr. East highly praised the child health work carried on in the Medford area, stating that Jackson county was one of the best if not the best organized counties in the state in trying to promote child health.

The speakers were introduced yesterday by Mrs. Elwood Hedberg, vice president of the association, who presided in the absence of Mrs. J. C. S. Wells. The nominating committee for the annual meeting to be held May 28 was appointed by Mrs. Hedberg as follows: Miss Helen Bullis, chairman, Mrs. Leonard Mayfield, Mrs. Lewis Ulrich of Medford; Mrs. A. Meunier of Gold Hill and Mrs. W. H. Higgins of Talent. The meeting will be preceded by a covered dish luncheon, as usual.

UNION SECRETARY GIVES DETAILS OF MEMBERSHIP DUES

Cantonment Workers Not
Accepted As Members
Unless Can Be Given Job.

Charles W. Tower, secretary of the Medford Building Trades Council issued the following statement today regarding the union methods in handling membership applications and dues for men seeking employment at Camp White:

"From information reaching our members it seems that there is a general misunderstanding in regard to acceptance of new members to work on the army camp here.

"In order that the general public may be properly informed, we believe it only fair that we should make a statement in regard to acceptance of members, application fees to be paid by such members and other general requirements relative to the employment of new men on national defense or construction work. The local unions affiliated with the Medford Building Trades Council have a need for and will accept as members all the good qualified workmen possible to obtain. We, however, cannot accept as members men not capable of performing the work.

"We are accepting applications for membership from all men who may be able to qualify in the type of work which comes under the jurisdiction of the Building Trades Council. All such men are placed on a probationary period varying from one to three months in order to give them opportunity to prove themselves capable of performing the work required of them and to satisfy our employer that they are capable.

"Men accepted on probation are required to make a down payment on their application for membership in any particular craft and are allowed the balance of the probation period in which to complete their application fee. No craft is accepting money on applications from men unless they are able to place these men on a job. In most of our contracts with employers, the employer reserves the right to be the sole judge of the fitness of any men to qualify for any position. Such a requirement makes a probationary period necessary.

"Local unions affiliated with the Building Trades Council have not increased their initiation fees because of the large amount of work in our jurisdiction at the present time and most of them have liberalized the method of paying the application fee in order to make it easy for men who are short of funds. The fact that men do not have sufficient funds has not deprived them of the opportunity to go to work and they are allowed to make payment on their application as their earnings from their job will permit. The initiation fees of the various crafts and the method of paying same, payment of dues and other information relative to our various Local Unions is as follows:

"Carpenters local 2067 initiation fee and how paid, \$25, \$15 and \$10 according to age; \$10 down and \$1 per work day; monthly dues \$2, \$1.50 and \$1, permit or clearance when no transfer, \$2 per month.

"Carpenters local 814 initiation fee and how paid, \$25, \$15 and \$10 according to age; \$10 down and \$2 per day; monthly dues, \$2; permit or clearance, \$2 per month.

"Electrical Workers local 659, initiation fee and how paid, \$27 \$27 journeyman, \$12 helper; \$6 down and \$7 per month and \$3 down and \$3 per month for three months, monthly dues \$3 to \$5; permit or clearance, \$1 to \$3 per month; assessment, 1 per cent of wage.

"Laborers local 1400 initiation fee and how paid, \$25, \$5 down and balance in 30 days; monthly dues \$2.50.

"Machinists local 1468 initiation fee and how paid, \$25; one-half down and balance in 30 days; monthly dues \$2.50.

"Painters local 1124, initiation fee and how paid \$50; \$10

down and balance in 30 days; monthly dues \$2 and B. T. cards, no transfer cards accepted; permit or clearance, \$2 and B. T. cards.

"Painters local 1364 initiation fee and how paid, \$50, \$10 down and balance in 30 days; monthly dues, \$1.75 and B. T. cards, no transfer cards accepted; permit or clearance, \$2 and B. T. cards.

"Plumbers local 418, initiation fee and how paid, \$100, \$20 down and 25 per cent of wages until paid; monthly dues, \$2 and B. T. cards, assessment 3 per cent of wage.

"Roofers local 140, initiation fee and how paid, \$25, \$5 down and \$1 per work day; monthly dues \$2.50 and B. T. cards.

"Teamsters local 962 initiation fee and how paid, \$25, \$10 down and balance in 30 days; monthly dues, \$2.50, transfer cards accepted only if job available.

"Plasterers and Cement Finishers local 711, initiation fee and how paid, \$50, \$12 down and balance at \$2 per day; monthly dues, \$6.50 per month and B. T. cards.

"Bricklayers local 2, initiation fee and how paid, \$50, \$14.50 down and balance at \$2 per work day; monthly dues, \$4.50 per month."
