Dallas, Texas, March 27—(AP)—The Dallas Journal, in a notice printed on its front page, today announced suspension of publication.

"This is the last publication of the Dallas Journal," the announcement read. . . . "Continuance is no longer economically plausible and would therefore constitute waste."

The Journal had been published for 27½ years.

Employment Office Now Asks Visitors

From now on those who make application at the United States Employment Service office at 45 North Fir street, will be asked what their hobbies are and what they do in their spare time, as well as what work experience they have had, an-

nounces Anthony J. Sambuck, representative of the U. S. Employment Service in Portland, who is here to confer with the local office manager, Lewis Ulrich.

The new system, called establishing potentialities, is intended to furnish the employment service with information as to what line of defense work applicants might be fitted into regardless of the lack of specific training or experience. Those making application at the office will be asked the questions by interviewers and the registrants will then be classified at this time to meet the pressing need for techniques applicable in the selection and referral of applicants for on-the-job or other training in occupations in which the available supply of workers is not sufficient to meet the demand.
