Washington, March 27—(AP)—Acting with the approval of a CIO union, a special investigator of the war labor board recommended today that four CIO stewards employed at the Cleveland plant of the Aluminum

Company of American be discharged for instigating a slow-down in the plant. Chairman William A. Davis of the WLB said the recommendations had been approved by officials of the CIO National Association of Die Casting Workers and Local 55 of the union. Applegate Octogenarian Still Devotee of Dance

Big Applegate, March 27—(Spl.)—George Peck likes to dance at 80, and dance he did at the old-time dance given in honor of his birthday by Upper Applegate grange Saturday night. For some time Mr. Peck has vowed he would quit dancing when he reached 80.

He was born in Ironton county, Missouri, March 17, 1862, and his first job was working in a truck garden for 50 cents a day when he was 12. Mr. Peck also worked at iron molding for seven years during his younger days. He holds the office of steward in the Upper Applegate grange.

About 75 neighbors and friends attended the dance, where all ages from 8 to 80 gave their interpretation of polkas, square dances, schottishes, and others. Something of the old western hospitality cropped up when a red-shirted cowboy from Steamboat dropped in unexpectedly, and an old-timer loaned him his Sunday shoes in place of hobnailed work shoes so that he could dance. Romantic Americans Australian Problem

Canberra, March 27—(AP)—A widely publicized controversy over marriages between United States soldiers and Australian girls echoed in the commonwealth parliament today when Prime Minister John Curtin told the house of representatives that the whole problem was under examination of federal authorities.

Australian newspapers for several days have devoted space to the opinions of churchmen and social leaders on the subject. They recalled that last year, during a few days visit by an American naval squadron in Australian ports, at least six marriages occurred.

Jap Shipping Loss Quarter of Total Owned Before War

London, March 27—(AP)—Since the start of the war in the Pacific Japan has lost about one quarter of the 4,000,000 tons of shipping she originally had available for troop transport, the allied review of international affairs, "Free Europe," estimated today.

The publication asserted that in any further extension of Pacific operations Japan would face a shipping problem and "must exercise caution, for about 130,000 tons of shipping are needed to transport a modern division with equipment."

It added, however, that the United Nations also have a shipping problem and said there apparently are not sufficient United States troops in Australia at present to start an immediate counter-offensive.
