

DEATH COMES TO
FIRST REGISTERED
NURSE OF STATE

Mrs. Olivia Dyer Osborne, one of Oregon's first trained nurses, passed away at a local hospital Friday afternoon following six weeks' illness. Mrs. Osborne, the first registered nurse in the state, was for many years an active member of the Oregon state examining board for nurses, having been appointed upon formation of that body by Governor Ben Olcott. She was an honorary member of the Oregon State Nurses association and well known in nursing and medical circles throughout the state.

She came to Medford in 1895, before the city had any hospitals, and until her death conducted the official District 4 registry for graduate nurses. Her home was at 512 South Oakdale avenue.

During Mrs. Osborne's long connection with nursing and the healing art she had seen great development and many changes in techniques. She retained a keen interest in her profession throughout the years and during her long and active career she gave unstintingly both to her work, her sister nurses and her community.

Mrs. Osborne was a graduate of the Illinois Training school connected with the Cook County hospital in Chicago. For a number of years she was assistant superintendent of the Presbyterian hospital in Chicago.

A lifelong member of the Methodist church and daughter of a Methodist minister, Olivia Dyer was born in South Hampton, Ontario, Canada. She was united in marriage to John Osborne in 1895, coming to Medford as a bride in that year. Mr. Osborne passed away here in 1913.

Mrs. Osborne is survived by a brother, Milton Dyer, Calgary, Alberta, one daughter, Mrs. Eva Jane Bohall, and four grandchildren, all of San Francisco.

Funeral services will be conducted by the Rev. L. F. Belknap in the Conger chapel, at 10:30 a.m. Monday. Interment will be in the Odd Fellows cemetery.

Full bearers will be William Warner, H. C. Best, Frank Van Dyke, C. H. Paske, Berthold Barnum and C. H. Gile.

ONE-WAY TRAFFIC
RULES BROADENED
FOR CAMP ROUTES
Extension of one-way traffic regulations on routes between Medford and the cantonment has been found necessary, Camp White officers said yesterday, revealing that permission had been secured from Engineer R. H. Baldoock of the state highway commission for inauguration of the changes.

Starting Monday, the one-way traffic requirement on Crater Lake highway will end at the junction with the old airport road, that is the road coming into Crater Lake highway near the county trailer camp.

Because a bottleneck has developed at certain times of the day on the highway north, the one-way rule will be extended, effective April 6, on the old Pacific highway to the junction with the new Pacific highway at the Big-Y corner. This will make continuous one-way traffic on Riverside avenue out to the cantonment, for northbound traffic.

Coordinator Frank Van Dyke will provide two guards to enforce the new regulation from the Big-Y corner on north, and one guard will be stationed at the Crater Lake highway-airport road junction.

IDA TALBOTT, OF
TALENT, PASSES
Ida Regina Talbott, a resident of Talent for the past 15 years, passed away at a local hospital Friday afternoon, after a brief illness.

Mrs. Talbott was one of the oldest pioneers of the State of Washington, being born January 4, 1864, and was one of the first pupils to attend the University of Washington. She arrived in Washington when she was six years of age, and crossed the plains with her parents by ox wagon. They started from Hagerstown, Md., in 1862, and Mrs. Talbott was born during the long trip.

She made her home with her daughter, Mrs. Harold B. Jordan of Talent. She is survived also by two sons, Herbert C., and Ivan Talbott of Seattle, Wn., three brothers, Herbert and Frank Conner of Seattle, and Guy W. Conner of Medford and one sister, Mrs. Lillian Kendall of Seattle.

Remains will be transferred to Seattle for services and interment. Perl funeral home in charge.

ASK MORATORIUM
UPON MINE WORK
Washington, March 28. — (AP) —Senator Murray (D-Mont.) introduced a bill (S2414) to suspend the annual work assessment as it applies to mining claims in the United States and Alaska.

The bill would suspend the labor requirement for the current fiscal year, which ends June 30. Under the present law \$100 worth of work must be put in annually on a claim until a patent is issued.

PAST \$800 MARK
POP GATES SAYS
Over \$800 has been subscribed toward the Medford quota for the Chinese relief fund, C. E. "Pop" Gates, chairman of the drive, said yesterday.

One of the most useful contributions made this week, the chairman pointed out, was not in money. Miss Bernice Cameron, 112 Geneva street, former manager for Postal Telegraph here, donated surgical instruments and materials belonging to her brother, Dr. Warren L. Cameron, who passed away in 1936.

Both Gates and Miss Cameron expressed the need of this gift, valued at several hundred dollars. The country, through United China Relief, Inc., has expressed the shortage of surgical materials.

The contribution is on display at the chamber of commerce building.

3 HURT IN CRASH
ON MIDWAY ROAD
Injured when their car overturned on the Midway road near the state forest patrol station late yesterday afternoon, three men, all of Jacksonville, were taken to the Community hospital.

The injured were:
Eddie Beltram, 31, severe scalp wound and concussion;
Alphonso Valencia, 35, broken left clavicle and chest injuries;
Castolo Benitas, 48, bruises and minor injuries.

The occupants were on their way to work at the cantonment when the accident occurred. State police said that the left front tire of the machine, a model A coupe, blew out causing the car to skid. Collapse of the wheel forced the vehicle to overturn and crash into a tree.

The men were thrown clear. Report from the state police last night said that they had not learned who was driving the auto. The men were taken to the hospital by the Perl and the cantonment ambulances and were said last night to be resting comfortably.

Central Point Mill
Starts Second Shift
The Southern Oregon Sugar Pine company's mill at Central Point has inaugurated a second shift, according to Chauncey Florey, manager, who said yesterday the mill operation would

continue under the expanded schedule as long as sufficient employees were available. He stated over 75 men are now employed in mill and yard and more help in all classifications is needed.

The company also operates a large sawmill at Tiller with approximately the same number of employees as in the Central Point plant.

Makeshift Chimneys
And Stovepipe Holes
Violate Fire Rules
Makeshift chimneys and stovepipe holes, such as taking a stovepipe out through a window, violate safety regulations, Fire Chief Roy Elliott stated yesterday in a warning directed at those who have fitted up spare quarters for accommodation of cantonment workers and others recently arriving in the city.

The fire chief also said that because of war conditions an early spring cleanup is advisable. He asked residents to clean out attics and other places where rubbish accumulates, immediately and see that the rubbish is properly disposed of.

Trash may be burned during the day without a permit at the present time. Such fires are not allowed at night. Notice will appear in the paper later when dry conditions make securing of a permit necessary.

UPSTATE NIPPONS
WAIT EVACUATION
Portland, March 28. — (P) —Japanese thronged government offices and temporary headquarters of the Japanese-American citizens league today, striving to get their personal affairs in order before the Sunday midnight deadline for voluntary evacuation.

All permits will be cancelled at deadline time and later evacuation will be conducted by military authorities, the wartime civilian control administration announced.

Portland, Ore., March 28. — (P) —Produce wholesalers today threatened to boycott the Farmers' Wholesale Market for setting a later opening hour to accommodate Japanese gardeners affected by the enemy alien curfew.

The market management announced that opening time would be delayed until 6:30 a.m., effective Monday, after fresh vegetable supplies declined sharply this morning because foreign and native born Japanese were absent. The curfew ends at 6 a.m.

GRAIN PRICES UP
Chicago, March 28. — (P) —A brisk and unexpected buying spree whirled grain prices up more than a cent a bushel and soybeans almost five cents today, erasing the week's decline in most pits.

J'VILLE ROAD AUTO
PLUNGE FATAL TO
CALIFORNIA MAN
Herbert Cahen, 59, of Oakland, Calif., was fatally injured late Friday night when the 1931 Pontiac sedan he was driving plunged over a 12-foot bank one-half mile west of Jacksonville.

Cahen, whose skull was severely fractured, died yesterday morning. He was said to be a cantonment worker. The other occupants of the car, Mr. and Mrs. Jack Eaton, 209 W. 8th street, escaped with minor lacerations and bruises. They were taken to the Community hospital by the Perl ambulance and were released yesterday.

According to reports from the state police, the left rear tire of Cahen's machine blew out forcing it to leave the road. The car apparently overturned several times. The trio was returning by way of Applegate from Grants Pass.

State police were today contacting a brother of Cahen who resides in San Francisco. H. W. Conger, county coroner, said that word from the district attorney's office indicated that there would be no inquest.
