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DEADLINE TODAY FOR CANDIDATES IN MAY PRIMARY

Only 208 in Lists So Far, Compared With 317 Four Years Ago—Local Filings

Salem, March 30.—(P)—Forty-two candidates for the May 15 primary election filed declarations of candidacy this morning, bringing the total number to 208, with the deadline to come at 5 p. m. today.

At least 50 more filings, several of them for major offices, were expected this afternoon. Included among those to come are Secretary of State Earl Snell, to file for republican nomination for governor; and Speaker of the House Robert S. Farrell, Jr., candidate for Secretary of State on the republican ticket.

The total number of filings four years ago, when the same office were open, was 317, while the total two years ago was 425. Marvin T. Warlick, Eugene, filed for the democratic nomination for representative in congress from the new fourth district. Other democrats already filed are Floyd K. Dover of Grants Pass and Edward C. Kelly of Medford, but Dover had not completed his petitions up to noon.

Clarence F. Hyde, Eugene, became the first democrat to file for labor commissioner.

Other filings today included: Walter J. Looker, Medford republican, for state senator from Jackson county.

M. C. Athey, Cave Junction and Rep. Kenneth S. Martin, Grants Pass, both republicans, for state representative from Josephine county.

State Representative William M. McAllister, Medford republican, for state representative from Jackson county.

Lee Jacobs, Klamath Falls democrat, for state representative from Klamath county.

PEARL HARBOR LIST IS REVISED BY ARMY

Washington, March 30.—(P)—The war department says the Japanese killed 226 army men and wounded 396 at Pearl Harbor December 7.

These figures were given in a revised casualty list issued last night which contained 87 new names.

An incomplete earlier listing had given the total as 168 killed, 223 wounded and 26 missing.

TEST REACTIONS OF AVERAGE FOLK DURING AIR RAID

Lecture Room In New York Scene of Experiment to Find Dependable Portion.

New York (U.P.)—The sound of air bombs exploding and airplanes machine-gunning streets echo through a lecture room of the New York museum of science and industry almost daily but it is only to test how Mr. and Mrs. Average American will act in an air raid.

The bombs and machine guns are all on a sound track and no one's life is in danger.

Dr. Theodore A. Jackson of the psychology department of Columbia university thought up the idea of imitating at least part of an air raid sequence in an effort to discover what proportion of the population can be expected to behave sensibly in an air raid, and what part will "go to pieces."

His tests, Jackson said, might prove valuable in determining how much you can depend on your air raid warden, for example.

"It is in the interest of the community to have people who remain relatively calm to take responsibility in emergencies. Also it is of importance to the individual to know how efficient he is likely to be in a crisis," Jackson said.

Tests Very Simple

Trouble with the first few tests he made was that no one showed much excitement over hearing the air raid siren, the machine-gunning plane, or the dive-bomber swooping down to loose its load—as recorded by the sound track.

The first subjects tested were an actress or two, a dancer, a woman air raid warden, a computer operator and a 19-year-old student from the City college of New York—"all people that don't scare very easily," Jackson said.

Simplicity of the tests would make them applicable to children, although none has been tried yet.

First of all, you sit before a board with eight colored lights and eight different keys. An attendant flashes the lights on, and you see how quickly you can shut them off with the keys.

Next you grab two metal cylinders through which runs a tiny electrical current connected with a meter. Someone starts the sound track with an air raid warning siren going full blast, slides into the machine gunning and then the dive-bomber sequence, which ends with a bump and the sound of falling bricks.

The idea is that if you get excited at the noise, your body resistance drops and the hand on the meter moves, showing just how excited you are.

Will Test Several Hundreds
Then you take another test with the light board, to see if your excitement has affected your ability to turn off the lights.

As a final test, you have to put out a small fire with a pump-type extinguisher. This test is timed to show if there is any relation between your ability to use your hands and your ability to withstand emotional shocks.

Jackson explains that a really excitable person would make the meter hand jump all over the dial during the air raid noises. While the test falls far short of reproducing an actual raid, he explains, it may give an index to the excitability of the population in general.

But before he can reach any definite conclusions, Jackson says he must try it on a lot of people, housewives, professional

SABOTAGE SEEN IN S. P. BRIDGE FIRES

El Centro, Calif., March 30.—Traffic over the southern Pacific's main line near here was restored early today with the temporary repair of two wooden trestles which officials say were deliberately set afire.

The FBI pointed local officers and railroad agents in a hunt for saboteurs, since evidence of oil was found on both trestles.

Under Sheriff Rodney Clarke said the trestles, which span dry washes, are in the Niland tomato growing district, occupied almost entirely by Japanese awaiting the army's evacuation order.
