'TOTAL WAR DAY' TO BE MARKED BY EXERCISES HERE

By proclamation of President Roosevelt, Governor Charles A. Sprague and Mayor H. S. Deuel, April 6 has been designated as Total War Day, with civic organizations and groups in national defense participating in observance of the usual Army day celebration.

The program, which will be announced in detail in a later edition of the Mail Tribune, includes a mass parade beginning at 7:15 p. m. Monday in which all organizations are asked to participate. High officers of the army will lead the parade which terminates at the high school football field where a practical demonstration of burning incendiary bombs will be given. A demonstration of first aid and speeches by officers of the U. S. army and others is planned.

Parade preparations are in charge of the Jackson county council of civilian defense. Colonel W. H. Paine will be marshal in the parade with George Field as his assistant.
