

HUGG SENTENCING DELAYED ACCOUNT RESTRAINT ORDER

Sentence of Ashley L. Hugg of Rogue River, charged with disorderly conduct, was deferred in justice court yesterday, due to his being under a restraining order issued in circuit court last week. The order restrained Hugg from molesting his wife or her family. The complaint was signed by Nellie M. Jones of Rogue River. Hugg allegedly visited her home and kicked in a door and tore the casing loose.

The circuit court restraining order was issued when Hugg was charged with creating a disturbance at the house and hitting Walter Jones, former Rogue River mayor, breaking his glasses and false teeth.

William L. McDonald, Medford, was assessed \$7.70, and George L. Roberts, Roseburg, paid \$8.10 for driving overloaded logging trucks on the Crater Lake highway. Both were previously similarly charged and fined. John C. Childreth, Trail, was fined \$1.50 and costs for an overheight load on a truck.

Louis E. Van Vliet, Central Point, charged with being drunk on a public highway, was fined \$5 and costs. Raymond S. Wooley and Sherman Wooley, Eagle Point, charged with drunk and disorderly conduct, were each fined \$1 and costs.
