

SNELL DISCUSSES TAX SITUATION IN ROTARY ADDRESS

An enlightening discussion of Oregon's tax situation was presented at the Tuesday luncheon meeting of Medford Rotary club by Earl Snell, secretary of state.

Mr. Snell spoke at the Hotel Medford before an audience comprising Rotarians and members of local service clubs.

"With the national debt mounting steadily and likely to reach the staggering total of 150 billion dollars, there is greater need than ever before for more economy and efficiency in local and state government," Secretary Snell said. "There are, with in sight at this time, many new taxes which will make serious demands upon the income of the average citizen. Among these taxes will be increased levies on income, possible national sales taxes, etc. State and local taxes must be cut to the bone if these federal taxes are to be met," he warned.

Mr. Snell briefly outlined the financial condition of the state, reminding his audience that the state's bonded indebtedness had been sharply reduced, that state highway bonds have been reduced to 11 million dollars and that motor vehicle income reached a new all-time high in 1941. The change from calendar to fiscal year brings an added burden on taxpayers at this time, he said.

Public officials must lessen the tax burden right now so that loyal and patriotic citizens will be financially able to bear the burden of federal taxation so vital to the prosecution of the war, Snell emphasized.

In his introductory remarks the speaker warned of greater sacrifices on the part of the public if victory in the war is to be achieved. "We can now see the light of victory but it will not be an easy task to achieve it."

In reminding that war sacrifices "would reach into every home," Secretary of State Snell cited as immediate factors affecting the economy of the state and nation the change from peace production to war output, priorities, transportation, war financing, mounting taxes and restricted markets.

Conservative use of automobiles was urged by Mr. Snell as a factor in civilian morale and an instrument of greater efficiency in business and civilian defense work. Slow speed and regular checking of inflation will increase the mileage of good tires several thousand miles, he stated. Snell, a member of the five man highway traffic advisory committee of the war department, is considered an authority in matters pertaining to traffic.

Following the Rotary club meeting, Mr. Snell visited friends in this city and inspected the newly opened "Snell for Governor" headquarters at 33 South Riverside avenue.

REFORMERS WIN OFFICES IN K. C.

Kansas City, April 1.—(AP)—Mayor John C.age and his reform ticket which ousted the old Pendergast machine from the city hall two years ago were swept back into office yesterday with majorities far exceeding those of their 1940 triumph.

Gage defeated John M. Linger, who was backed by James M. Pendergast and Rep. Joseph Shannon, by 30,000 votes, 10,000 more than the majority he rolled up in 1940 when the machine was reeling from disclosures involving its leaders and which sent several of them to the penitentiary. Approximately 138,500 votes were cast, compared with 165,000 two years ago.

Seven of the eight council seats went to candidates on the Gage ticket as did the two municipal judgeships.

On the evening of Good Friday at 7:30 a brief devotional service is planned with a meditation on "The Last Great Week."

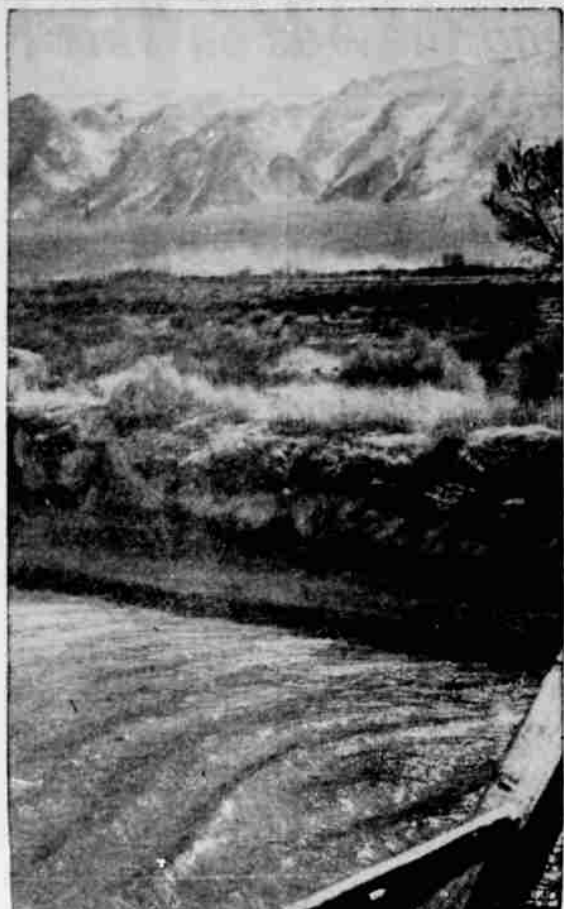

She is residing with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. S. G. Burkett, at the Rogue View auto court on the Pacific highway and commutes daily to her new position.

Max Henne, station manager at the Medford United Air Lines office, said today that increase of operations here made it necessary to add Miss La Barr to the office force. She will handle reservations, telephoning and other office duties.

During the past month the local station set an all time record for passengers arriving and departing from the Medford airport. A total of 936 passengers were handled through the office making an average of 30 passengers a day. Departing were 471 passengers and arriving were 465 passengers. Of the 280 Mainliners flying over Medford 268 of this number landed at the Medford airport, including flag stop planes.
