Isolationist Group Facing Charges of Sedition and Libel

Los Angeles, April 1.—(AP)—Isolationists Robert C. Noble, who shouted "To hell with MacArthur," and Ellis O. Jones, who led a mock impeachment of President Roosevelt, were re-arrested last night on federal charges of sedition.

Almost simultaneously, the state filed criminal libel charges against Noble, Jones and seven others, accusing them of having libeled Gen. Douglas MacArthur in a pamphlet distributed by their Friends of Progress isolationist organization. Attorney General Earl

CAMP WHITE LAND OWNERS TO FIGHT FOR HIGHER PRICE

(Continued from Page One)

The land-owners have been advised they must evacuate their property by June 1, as construction on the cantonment is moving toward the Beagle area, the spokesman said. The largest ranch involved in the dispute over appraisal-price is of 750 acres with the others ranging downward to five acres, the spokesman explained.

Problem For Owners

One of the most pressing problems facing the families who must leave their ranches and farms and relocate is the gap between the time they evacuate and the time they receive their government checks for options on their lands, it was pointed out. This takes between three and four months.

It was explained that most of the families desired to purchase other ranches or farms, but that these could be bought only by "cash on the barrelhead" or by substantial down payments. Many of the families won't have sufficient cash on hand to make deals until they receive their money from the government and what they will do in the intervening three or four months.

ZERO HOUR TODAY ON INCOME TAXES

Salem, April 1.—(AP)—Thousands of state income taxpayers crowded state tax commission offices today to beat the deadline of midnight tonight for filing 1941 tax returns and for paying the first half of the taxes. The commission's Portland and Salem offices will be open until midnight.

The commission said penalties would begin tomorrow. Minimum penalties are five per cent of the tax plus \$1.

The commission, denying reports of a huge income tax surplus, said the income tax account would be in the red when the legislature meets next January. All income tax receipts in excess of appropriations are used to reduce property taxes.

103 DRIVERS
