

TRAINING COURSE FOR NURSE AIDES IS DEFENSE PLAN

A training course for nurses aides is scheduled to start next week and registration will be accepted Thursday and Friday of this week at the Chamber of Commerce between the hours of 10 a. m. and 12 noon and 1 to 3 p. m.

The American Red Cross in collaboration with the Office of Civilian Defense has issued a nation-wide appeal for 100,000 nurses aides, women who will volunteer their services, and after completing the course of instruction, work in local hospitals and health agencies as assistants to graduate nurses.

It was explained today that the volunteer nurses aide corps is a trained and disciplined service with an intensive 80 hour training course outlined for those enrolled. Thirty-five hours of class instruction is given under a qualified graduate nurse with 45 hours of supervised hospital practice as a preliminary to the minimum of 150 hours of annual service without pay, required by every nurse aide. American women between the ages of 18 and 50 in good health, citizens, and with a high school education or its equivalent will be considered for enrollment.

Portland Prosperity Shown in Bank Trade

Portland, Ore., April 1.—(P)—Portland bank clearings increased 30 per cent in March over the same month a year ago, the Federal Reserve bank announced today. They totaled \$259,148,366 compared with \$199,894,572. February clearings came to \$189,566,440. Building permits declined 38 per cent from last year but were about even with February: 391 permits for \$1,038,195, in March, 531 for \$1,712,495 in March of 1941, 317 for \$1,007,395 for February.

Ashland Jersey Wins Silver Medal Award

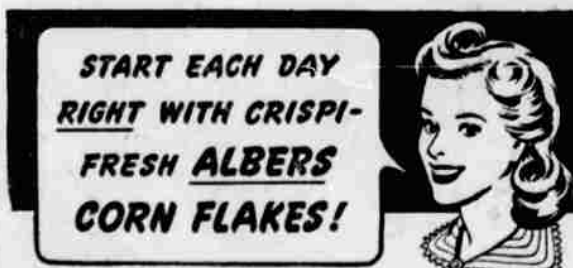
New York, N. Y., April 1.—(Spl)—The purebred Jersey cow, Empress Verla of Myer Creek, in the herd owned by J. R. and E. L. McCracken at Ashland, Ore., has qualified for the silver medal award of the American Jersey Cattle club, New York, N. Y. The award was merited by the butterfat production record of the cow in an official test supervised under the register of merit system of the club.

The silver medal winner yielded 474.98 pounds of butterfat, 8,065 pounds of milk in 305 days. She was started on test at the age of three years and was milked twice daily.

From where I sit...

BEST storekeeper I ever knew was a fellow named Sam Abernethy. Sam's specialty was to take over some run-down store that somebody else had given up as a failure. Then Sam would turn it into a gold mine.

"But the most important thing of all," he used to say, "is to remember who's Boss!"

"You may think you are Boss of your business... but you're not. The Public, your customers, are the real bosses... and you've got to run your business the way they want it."

That little statement of Sam's made a big impression on me... particularly since it certainly seemed to work so well in Sam's case.

And Sam isn't the only one. I see the beer industry feels the same way... certainly, the brewers believe in running their business the way you and I would like to see it run.

Folks like us like to see beer sold in clean, quiet, decent places.

Well... the brewers feel the same way about it. They don't want their beer sold in wrong surroundings. They know it doesn't pay. And they know it hurts the good name of beer.

I was reading the other day how the brewers and the beer distributors work together and cooperate with law enforcement authorities. The idea is to make careless beer retailers clean up their places and practices... or close up.

It's a good plan... and it seems to me it ought to work. I understand it is already in operation in a number of states and is being extended.

It's a mighty fine thing when a great industry has the gumption to do a job like that on its own initiative. And if Sam Abernethy was right, the brewers should be mighty successful... because they're running their business the way the public wants to see it run.
