BUILDING PERMITS \$17,950 IN MARCH

Applications for building permits in Medford during March totaled \$17,950, according to report from the city building inspector's office today.

The amount was \$3,375 above the \$14,575 mark for February but far below the \$48,880 total for January.

Cost of two new business buildings amounted to \$4,000 and the sum for remodeling six business houses was \$4,625. Residential permits totaled \$8,975 with \$975 of that for renovations.

Estimated cost of two garages was \$350.

JAP LAWYER ACQUITTED OF REGISTER FAILURE

Seattle, April 2.—(AP)—A federal court jury having found him innocent of failing to register as an agent of the Japanese government, Kenjo Ito, Seattle-born Japanese attorney, stood ready today to "serve my country in any capacity and to make any sacrifice that may be necessary to defend the American way of life."

Ito, tried on counts based on his activities prior to December 7, made the offer of service to the United States immediately after the jury acquitted him late yesterday.

World Wheat Supply May Be Larger Than Ever Before, Belief

Washington, April 2.—(AP)—Despite two successive short war crops and prospects that 1942 production may be smaller yet the world may have a larger supply of wheat this year than ever before, the agriculture department said today.

This is because the surplus existing in the world's four leading exporting nations—the United States, Canada, Australia and Argentina—is the largest of record.

The department said that present prospects indicated a total 1942 crop for most of the world of around 3,950,000,000 bushels, or slightly less than was harvested last year. This figure compares with the record crop of 4,636,000,000 produced in 1938. Russia and China are excluded from the world figures because inadequate information has been available.

The world—again exclusive of Russia and China—is expected to have a carryover of about 1,590,000,000 bushels of old wheat when the 1942 crop is harvested. Of this amount, only about 175,000,000 bushels were expected to be held by countries other than the United States, Canada, Australia and Argentina.

CURTIS M'GREW TAKEN BY DEATH

Curtis A. McGrew, 69, born of pioneer Oregon parents in Polk county April 4, 1872, passed away in Central Point at 6 p. m. Wednesday.

Mr. McGrew has spent practically all his life in Oregon and has resided in Jackson county for the last 31 years. The last two years was spent at Prospect. For many years prior to that he resided at Talent.

Besides his wife, Tresa McGrew, he leaves three sons, Curtis, Melvin and Elroy McGrew, all of Prospect. Also two sisters, Mrs. G. A. Briner of Talent and Mrs. C. A. Ball of Portland. Also two grandchildren, Marjory and Gerald McGrew.

Funeral services will be conducted by Dr. Sherman L. Divine in the Conger chapel at 1 p. m. Saturday with interment in the Talent cemetery.

DeGaulle in Warning To United Nations

London, April 2.—(AP)—Gen. Charles De Gaulle indicated today in feeling that his Free French movement is being pushed aside and in a warning note declared, "fighting France means to go forward shoulder to shoulder with her allies on the express condition that her allies go forward with her."

In a luncheon speech he hinted that the United Nations should conduct negotiations relating to French matters with Free French headquarters in London, not with Vichy.

DEPUTY SHERIFFS IN NEW UNIFORMS

Deputy sheriffs of Jackson county are now garbed in new uniforms, with dark green the main color. The trousers have a green stripe down the legs, and the shirt is a lighter shade. The insignia of office in yellow and green is on the shoulders. The uniforms give the deputies a natty and semi-military appearance.

The uniforms were purchased to comply with the state law requiring officers making traffic arrests to be in uniforms, and be more easily recognized by the public.

The uniforms, purchased by the deputies with their own funds, are similar to those used in Multnomah county.

New York, April 2.—(AP)—The city selective service headquarters said today that Joseph P. Lash, 32-year-old general secretary of the International Student Service, had been ordered to report for induction into military service April 13.

Lash, a friend of Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt and former member of the national defense advisory board's youth division of the office of civilian defense, applied for a commission in the naval intelligence service early this year. His application was rejected.

The Dies committee investigating un-American activities questioned Lash in 1939 when he was executive secretary of the American Students Union. He denied then that he was or ever had been a communist.

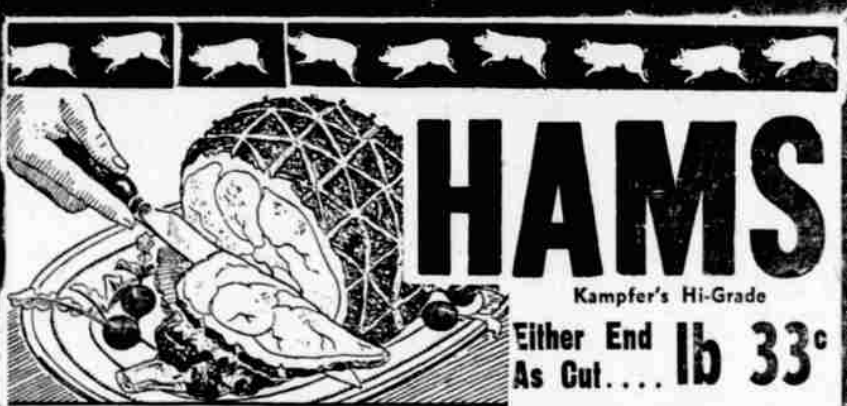
